U. S. MARINES PAY MORE THAN FOREIGN OFFICERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 5.—According to statistics in a war bulletin, issued recently by the National Geographic Society from its headquarters here, a first class private in the United States Marine Corps serving abroad draws \$41 a year more than a Russian colonel; \$44 a year more than a German lieutenant; for the first three years; \$31 a year more than a first lieutenant of the Austrian army, and \$19 a year more than a junior lieutenant in the service of Italy.

President's Cabinet Endorses Suffrage

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Five members of President Wilson's cabinet endorsed woman suffrage in statements made public here by Mrs. Norman Duff, Whitehouse, chairman of the New York Woman Suffrage party.

Following are extracts from statements:

Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy: "The mothers of men train their boys for citizenship, and if they are to be trusted with the early education of the boys, there is no reason on earth why they should not be trusted with the ballot."

Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior: "I see no reason to fear woman suffrage. It has not worked disaster in California. As a matter of political policy, woman suffrage can not be put aside, and as a matter of wise policy it is not to be denied."

Davis P. Houston, secretary of agriculture: "The patriotism, the self control and intelligent action of women in the present emergency lend additional support to the argument, and should dispel any doubts fair-minded men may have entertained as to the wisdom of enfranchising them."

William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury: "The time has come when suffrage should be given to the women of America. It should be given promptly and ungrudgingly. The women of the United States have in every way since this war has broken out shown themselves qualified for the right of suffrage."

William C. Redfield, secretary of commerce: "I am an earnest believer in suffrage for women. There are large sections of our public affairs in which women—merely because they are women—are experts. The cause of education is one of these matters; another is the whole question of dealing with the liquor traffic in all its forms; so, also, are questions of child labor and of women in industry."

Every effort should be made to make the reservoir hold some water," said Engineer J. P. Newell of Portland, a member of the commission. Fred Wallace and H. M. Parks were the other two commissioners. Newell said the project has been constructed at a cost of \$475,000, and \$100 acres can be irrigated. If an additional supply of water can be secured from the Deschutes, he declared, 14,500 more acres could be added to the project, but even after this was sold, the state would lose \$100,000 on its investment, he said.

The engineers pointed out that if some use can be made of the present

dam, even if the leakage cannot be reduced below nine-tenths of the total volume of water accommodated in sixty days, the value of the storage will much exceed any expenditure contemplated to obtain it.

SALEM, Nov. 5.—In their report made to the state desert land board pronouncing the big Tumalo irrigation reservoir a failure, a commission of engineers named to investigate the project in Central Oregon declared that sluicing is the only way in which even a temporary stopping of the worst breaks may be accomplished. The leakage due to slow percolation thru porous material would permanently prevent the successful use of the reservoir for storage purposes, according to the engineers. They recommended that water be procured for irrigation of lands in the district from the Deschutes River.

To procure the water would involve the construction of canals and other works costing approximately \$340,000, it is estimated, and pending a water supply from this source the commission recommended that every attempt should be made to procure some returns from the present reservoir, on which \$187,000 has been spent.

SALEM, Nov. 5.—Superintendent Steiner of the state hospital for the insane has submitted a report to the board of control showing that the value of the farm products and livestock produced during the last three months to be \$87,943.73. The value of farm and garden products was placed at \$49,366.80; dairy products were valued at \$17,457.58; hogs at \$6,514.70, and poultry at \$14,609.35.
