BRIDE HAS
NARROW CALL

CLOSE ESCAPE FROM DEATH AT
HANDS OF FIRST HUSBAND AT
BEGINNING OF HONEYMOON
WITH SECOND

To be choked almost to death by
her first husband at the very begin-
ning of her honeymoon with the sec-
ond, was the sad experience yester-
day of Mrs. N. Cook, during the ab-
sence of the groom.

Mrs. Cook conducts the Denver
rooming house on West Main street.
According to the story given out by
the officials, Mrs. Cook had been sepa-
rated from her former mate, Prentiss
Griffin, for some time, but had met
him in San Francisco recently, and
the two had apparently decided to
forget their differences and dwell
again together. They returned to
Klamath Falls, and Sunday Mrs. Griffin
surprised her friends by going to
Yreka and uniting in the holy bond
with M. Cook, the Pelican hotel por-
ter. The direct cause of Griffin's as-
sault was not determined at the hear-
ing yesterday, as he is said by the of-
ficers to have been in a most peculiar
condition for one in a place where
there is no liquor available, such as
Klamath Falls. There seems little
doubt, however, but that he would
have ended the life of his former
spouse except for the timely inter-
ference of two women employees of
the place. He pleaded guilty to a
charge of assault and battery before
Justice E. W. Gowan, and was fined
\$10 and costs this morning.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—Presi-
dent Wilson's labor mediator com-
mission, one of whose members, Ver-
ner Z. Reed of Denver, is here, has
ramped out an ambitious program for
the settlement of labor differences in
the Western states from the Mexican
to the Canadian line. Every phase of
the condition of unrest which is de-

the coast will be gone into.

San Francisco Starts
"Hooverizing" Today

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—San
Francisco hotels, restaurants and caf-
eterias observed their first "meatless
Tuesday" yesterday. Today they will
observe "Wheatless Wednesday."
These "meatless Tuesdays" and
"wheatless Wednesdays" will remain
in effect until the emergency which
demanded their establishment has
passed.

The unanimous membership of the
San Francisco Restaurant Men's As-
sociation has been pledged to strictly
observe these days.

The food administration has de-

fined "meatless Tuesday" as a day on
which no beef, mutton, veal, lamb or
pork in any form is to be served, and
no animal fat except butter is to be
used. Meat sandwiches, hashes and
stews, and soups made from meats
are under the ban. "Wheatless Wed-
nesday" means that no bread, pies or
cakes made wholly of wheat flour are
to be served. As a substitute, corn,
graham and rye flour are recommend-
ed. If any cakes or pies are served
they are to be made of flour in which
the wheat content shall not exceed 8
per cent.

UNCLE SAM'S EQUIPMENT
BRINGS OUT VERSES ON GEN-
ERAL CONDITIONS

The work of the commission is to
see specifically that the supply of
minerals and timber included in the
emergency shipbuilding and other
construction programs of the govern-
ment moves along in uninterrupted
streams. In order that both sides in
every controversy will be given a

contains a labor representative in the
person of John H. Walker, president
of the Illinois State Federation of
Labor, and a representative of capi-
tal in the person of Colonel John L.
Spangler, who has big coal mining
interests in Pennsylvania.

Two working miners accompany
the commission for its Arizona work,
and a staff of stenographers and as-
sistant secretaries is also carried.

In addition to mediating strikes,
the commission is aiding Arizona
mine owners in securing necessary oil
and timber supplies. It will continue
this policy wherever the mines or
mills and the necessary supply
sources for these concerns need to
be brought close together.
