MUCH JAM IS SENT TO FRANCE

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The British army in France gets nearly 3,000,000 pounds of jam every week from this country. The daily ration of three ounces of cheese calls for a shipment of between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 pounds weekly, while the daily ration of just over half an ounce of tea absorbs over half a million pounds each week.

Notice is hereby given that the following petition for the organization of Shasta View Irrigation District will be presented to the County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, at the regular meeting of said court, on the first Wednesday in December, 1917, at 10 o'clock a. m. of said day, at the county court house, in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, for its consideration and action:

Petition

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Klamath County.
In the Matter of the Organization of the Shasta View Irrigation District.

To the Honorable County Court of Klamath County, Oregon:

Your petitioners represent as follows: That they propose the organization of an irrigation district, to be known as Shasta View Irrigation District, under the provisions of Chapter 357, Laws of Oregon for 1917.

That the boundaries of said proposed irrigation district are as follows:

Beginning at the corner common to sections 29, 30, 31 and 32, township 40 S., R. 12, E. W. M.;

Thence north ¼ mile;

Thence east 1 ¼ mile;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence East ¼ mile, to corner common to sections 27, 28, 33 and 34, township 41 S.;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile, to corner of sections 6, 7, 1, 12, township 41 S., R. 12, E. W. M.;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile;

Thence south ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile, to the center ¼ corner, section 7, township 41 S., R. 13 E. W. M.;

Thence south 2 ¼ miles, to the Oregon and California line;

Thence west 1 mile to the Adam's or D Canal;

Thence in a northwesterly direction along said canal to the point where it crosses the section line between sections 3 and 10, township 41 S., R. 11 E. W. M.;

Thence east 900 feet to the ¼ corner of sections 3, 10;

Thence north 1 mile to the township line, townships 40-41 S.;

Thence east ¼ mile;

Thence north ¼ mile;

Thence east 1 ¼ mile;

Thence north ¼ mile;

Thence east ¼ mile, to the center of section 36;

Thence north ¼ mile;

Thence east ½ mile, to the range line, R. 11-12 E.;

Thence north ¼ mile; east ¼ mile; north ¼ mile; east ¼ mile to the point of beginning; all in Klamath County, State of Oregon.

That your petitioners constitute a majority of the owners of said land, numerically and in acreage, and that said land is susceptible of irrigation.

That your petitioners propose the organization of said district to provide for the construction of works for the irrigation of same and for the purchase, operation or maintenance of works already constructed, and for the assumption as principal or guarantor of indebtedness on account of district lands to the United States under the Federal Reclamation laws.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that said irrigation district be organized under said law of 1917.

UNCLE SAM TO FEED MEXICANS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—The United States will come to the aid of hungry Mexico.

Arrangements are now being made for the direct shipment of corn to the districts where it is most needed, under guarantee of the Carranza government that it will be distributed properly and that the cars in which it is shipped will be sent back. In return for this aid the Mexican embargo on metals will be relaxed in favor of the United States.

It is also possible that a loan to Mexico may be arranged. The state department has received confirmation of the failure of the Mexican corn crop, and widespread distress there.
