## WOULD POSTPONE STATE ROAD WORK

WEST COAST LUMBERMAN'S ASSOCIATION WOULD DELAY CONSTRUCTION ON HIGHWAYS DURING PERIOD OF WAR

Governor Withycombe has been called upon by the lumbermen of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest in general to delay the road program as mapped out in this state, and virtually do nothing toward the building or repairing of roads for the duration of the war which in any wise will cause competition with the lumber industry. At a recent meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's association held at Portland, a resolution to this effect was unanimously passed.

At this meeting it was decided that it was the duty of Oregon mills to meet the fir airplane stock need at the rate of 100,000 feet a day, or approximately 1 1/2 per cent of the daily output, and in priority to all other orders, and that the responsibility for obtaining this product be equally put on each mill in proportion to its productive capacity. Thus for a mill of 50,000 feet daily capacity being 750 feet a day; for 100,000 feet capacity 1,500 feet; for 200,000 feet capacity 3,000 feet, etc. The apportionment on this basis is being worked out, and regulations will be promptly issued by the fir emergency lumber committee.

A number of representatives of the fir emergency committee are now traveling among the mills of Oregon and Washington, conferring with the manufacturers in regard to the best methods of obtaining the greatest amount of airplane stock from the logs.
