The common council having completed its estimate of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for all purposes of the City of Klamath Falls, for the ensuing fiscal year of said city (said fiscal year beginning June 1, 1918) finds that the total amount to be raised by taxation for all purposes to be the sum of \$70,610.00. And the following itemized is a complete statement and disclosure of the contemplated expenditures of said amount of money to be raised by taxation:
