AMSTERDAM, Nov. 17.—A start-
ling news is to be introduced in Ger-
many this winter, according to the
German papers. Millions of pairs
will be manufactured, being made of
a leather substitute. The soles will
be formed of wood and small pieces
of leather.

San Diego Today**

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 17.—Thirty
thousand members of the new nation-
al army will swing past four gov-
ernors of Western states, the accredited
representatives of the great allied
nations, and delegates attending the
League of the Southwest, in session
here, when General Cameron, com-
mandant of Camp Kearney, leads his
men thru a great review here today.

The review will be given in honor
of the first session of the League of
the Southwest, which has been meet-
ing here to complete organization.
Governor Stephens of California, Gov-
ernor Hamberger of Utah, Governor
Campbell of Arizona and Governor
Gunter of Colorado, all of whom ap-
peared before the league, are to be in
the reviewing stand. Chevalier Mar-
dotti of Italy, Urio Oyama of Japan,
C. White Mortimer, representing the
British government, and many other
foreign representatives, are also hon-
or guests.

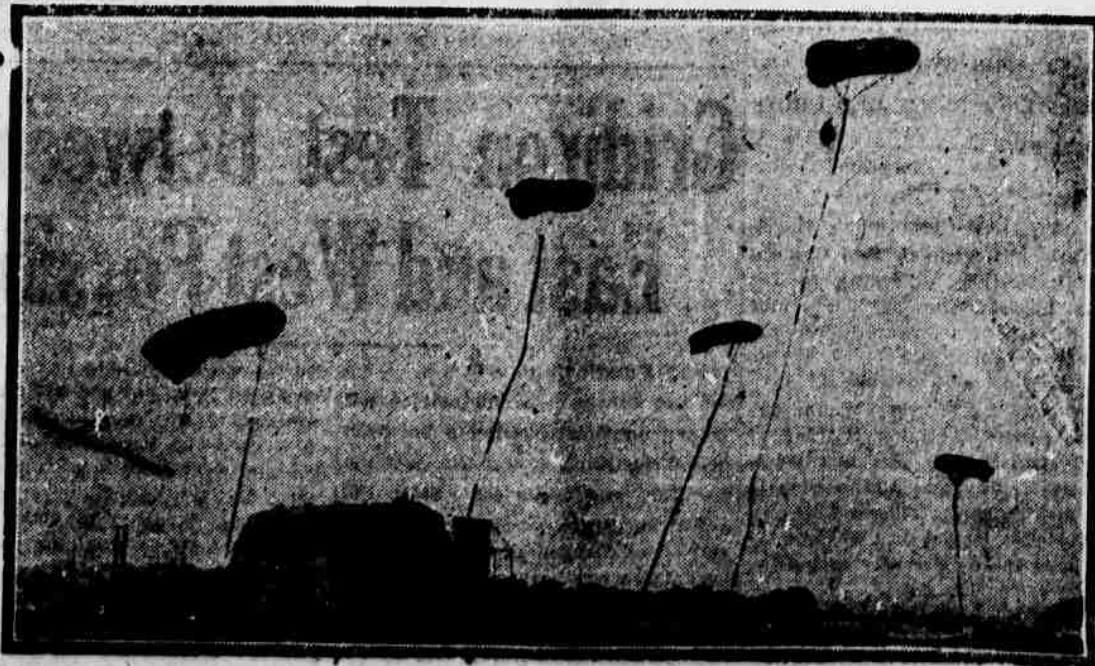
