U. S. Will Not Force Foreigners Into Army

BERNE, Oct. 31.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The news, received here by the American legation that the United States congress had adjourned without taking any action on the proposal to require military service of foreigners residing in the United States, has come as a great relief to Switzerland.

Military service by Swiss in America has been a moot subject in the Swiss press for weeks. A dozen papers have discussed the question cautiously, taking pains, it must be said in justice, to be carefully fair, and to weigh the whole problem objectively, yet revealing an obvious anxiety about the outcome.

With the strain removed for the time being by congress' postponement of the matter, the tendency in political circles is to admit frankly that any law enacted in America to compel military service from Swiss as yet un-naturalized, or with only their first
