VEGETARIANS URGE

A MEATLESS DIET

MANCHESTER, England, Nov. 23.—"The experience of the present war should result in the general adoption of the meatless diet," says the annual program adopted by the Vegetarian Society of Great Britain, which has just closed its annual convention here.

In his presidential address, Prof. Ernest Bell spoke of the "many hundreds of millions of men and women who are now obtaining a living out of the slaughter of animals and fish," and suggested that one of the social results of a general adoption of vegetarianism would be that "these people would turn to more humane and edifying work." He added, "at a time like this, when food is a most serious problem, it is monstrous to devote 64 pounds of dry grain to the production of one pound of beef."

Bernard Shaw, in a letter to the convention, said that he had been a vegetarian for forty years, and spoke of the meat diet as a relic of cannibalism.

Thanksgiving Day Proclamation Issued

SALEM, Nov. 23.—The following is the proclamation of Thanksgiving Day, issued by Governor James Withycombe:

"The year 1917 has visited a great cloud upon us, but so many rays of sunshine are cast across the dark valley thru which we are now passing, and so many blessings promise to come from the ultimate victory which must be ours, that we should join more unitedly and reverently than ever before as we again render our thanks giving unto Him who guides the destinies of continents and nations, states and individuals.

"We should not only express our deepest gratitude to Divine Providence for a bountiful harvest of the fruits of the soil and the blessings which come from industrial activity, but we should also be extremely thankful to our Divine Father for the true spirit of patriotism which characterizes our citizenship in this terrible hour of national peril. May we therefore mingle with our thankfulness for the material blessings bestowed by our Heavenly Father, our most earnest prayers for divine guidance as patriotic Americans toward a successful solution of a world's democracy and the ultimate establishment of a permanent peace between nations and of good will among men.

Each American is today privileged, as never before in all history, to serve and to assist in preserving, not only his own country, but he has for the first time a chance also to serve the world and humanity at large in the preservation and extension of justice and liberty, rich gifts which have long been ours to enjoy.

"As Oregonians we should feel especially proud and thankful that this state has stood so nobly at the forefront of the nation in all matters arising out of the world war. The our

WAR EMOTIONS INSPIRE MUSIC

IOWA CITY, Nov. 23.—The emotions stirred in the breasts by the war are causing a general desire for more music, and especially singing, is the opinion of Prof. W. E. Hays of the Iowa State University here. Patriotic songs and the old melodies such as "Home, Sweet Home," and "When You and I Were Young, Maggie," are being given a much wider vogue than ever before, he said.

The increase in the number of musical organizations at the university, and in the number of students joining these organizations is indicative of the national desire for more music, Prof. Hays states. The stress on music, he believes, will continue to increase thruout the war.

"Now, therefore, I, James Withycombe, governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested, and following the time-honored custom of the governors of the several states in joining with the President of the United States, do hereby proclaim Thursday, November 29, 1917, as Thanksgiving Day; and I call upon the people of Oregon to pause from their labors in a spirit of prayerfulness, and to give thanks to Almighty God, whom we worship, for the bounties and the blessings and the liberties which have been bestowed upon us and upon our commonwealth."
