EVERY SAMMIE GETS A PRESENT

SANTA CLAUS WILL DISTRIBUTE ONE HUNDRED TONS OF GIFTS TO AMERICAN BOYS ACROSS THE WATERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Every American sailor and soldier on duty over seas will receive a Christmas package from the American Red Cross, and as far as possible the gifts will be distributed on Christmas eve from a Christmas tree by a Santa Claus. It has been announced at headquarters of the Atlantic division here.

More than 100 tons of gifts have been sent already, and an additional supply has been assembled for shipment, so that all the packages will arrive "over there" before Christmas Day, it was said.

Each package contains from four to six articles, including pocket knives, trench mirrors, tobacco, puzzles, hard candies, writing pads, pencils and mouth organs. Besides this gift and the Christmas trees, the society has arranged for a Christmas Day entertainment, including choral singing, moving pictures and vaudeville.

Soldiers and sailors at home will be remembered also, and for this purpose 1,750,000 packages have been allotted to the various camps and cantonments, it was announced.

MORE WAR TO BE DECLARED

FORMAL DECLARATION AGAINST ALLIES OF GERMANY WITH WHOM U. S. IS ALREADY FIGHTING, TO BE MADE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 27.—Declarations of war against Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria seem exceedingly advisable to simplify the situation, which is now anomalous, according to a statement made by Chairman Stone of the foreign relations committee. "We are, in fact, now at war with Germany's allies," he said.

Legislators Gather for Important Session

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 27.—Members of congress are beginning to return to Washington for the opening of the second session of the war, Monday, December 3. Most of them expect the new session to rival the last in important action, and few think it will end before the general campaigns next fall.

Appropriations for the war promise to require much time, and there is much new as well as unfinished war legislation to be dealt with. Many other domestic matters, including prohibition and woman suffrage, are promised attention.

Future relations between this nation and Germany's allies may be determined early in the session. Many members of congress are expecting the president's opening address to deal with the question of whether war shall be declared against Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria. Sentiment in favor of such action is general among members now here.

Work on the appropriation bills for the fiscal year beginning July 1 next already has begun by the house appropriations committee, which will have a constant stream of the supply bills to go thru the congressional machinery.

The first formal pre-session activity will be the opening of investigation by a senate election provision of Senator LaFollette's alleged disloyal St. Paul speech. An executive session of the subcommittee to determine procedure will be followed shortly by examination of witnesses.

Brilliant Schemes of Crown Prince Shattered

FRENCH FORT, Oct. 17.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—One of the disappointments which the German crown prince has suffered since the utter defeat of his great efforts to capture Verdun has just been brought to light in documents found on German prisoners. From these it appears that while the French were inflicting their smashing blows on the German troops still menacing Verdun on August 20th last—when the crown prince not only lost some valuable ground but about 8,000 of his selected men were taken prisoners—the Germans were carefully preparing an attack on a grand scale from a point about a mile to the east of Auberville, to the Souain height. French activity in front of the fortress of Verdun upset these plans completely, and caused the crown prince to put off for an indefinite period any attempt to carry out an offensive movement in this region.

DAUGHTER OF THE EX CZAR COMING

HAS ESCAPED FROM SIBERIA AND WILL VISIT AMERICA—CHAPERONED BY ENGLISH WOMAN

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Miss Tatiana Nicholaevna Romanoff, second daughter of Nicholas Romanoff, deposed emperor of Russia, has escaped from Siberia thru a fictitious marriage to a son of a former chamberlain of the emperor, and is now on her way to the United States, chaperoned by an English woman, according to information made public here by persons connected with the Russian civilian relief.

The former grand duchess, who is 26 years of age, made her escape from Tobolsk, the present home of the exiled emperor, to Harbin, Manchuria, and thence to Japan, where passage was taken on a steamship for the Pacific coast.

The New York officers of the Russian civilian relief have been informed that the young woman will arrive in New York some time in December to play a prominent part in the work of

the recently formed organization. According to an announcement Miss Romanoff intends to remain one year in this country, and while in New York her guardian and companion will be Mrs. Margaret Barry Carver of Denver, who left this city last Friday for the Pacific Coast.

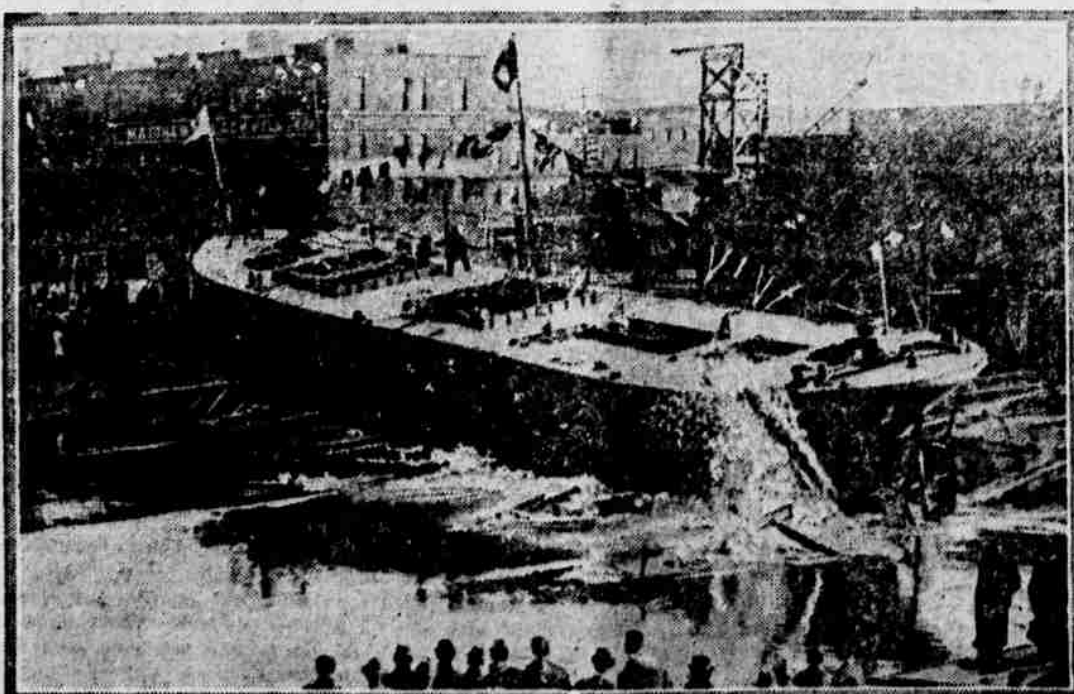
