BOHEMIAN, Mont., Nov. 28.—The wo-
men of the Montana State College have
signed a pledge to eat but six small
pieces of candy a week, and but one
tablespoonful of sugar a day as their
part in the sugar conservation move-
ment. They will maintain this ration
until January 15th, or longer, if neces-
sary.

The pledge was arranged in accord-
ance with the suggestion of Professor
Alfred Atkinson, federal food com-
missioner for the state of Montana.
The women students have already
pledged themselves to save as much as
possible in the consumption of other
foodstuffs.

**ARRESTED FOR
STEALING SHEEP**

**SHEEP HERDER BROUGHT IN AC-
CUSED OF STEALING THIRTY
HEAD OF SHEEP IN EASTERN
KLAMATH**

Charged with the larceny of sheep,
William Culver was brought in by
Sheriff George Humphrey yesterday
afternoon from the Antelope ranch,
east of Langell Valley.

Culver is charged with taking and
branding thirty head of sheep belong-
ing to O. T. McKendree of this city. The
warrant was made out on his com-
plaint. The defendant was arraigned
before Justice E. W. Gowen this morn-
ing, and his bonds placed at \$600. The
date of his examination has not been
set.

Culver has been engaged as herder
for Ivan Kilgore, who runs sheep in
the Antelope section.

GOVERNMENT EXAMS**HELD HERE SOON**

The United States Civil Service Com-
mission will hold examinations for
typewriters and stenographers and
typewriters on December 1, December
14, 1917, and January 5, 1918. Ten thou-
sand typewriters, stenographers and
typewriters are wanted for the govern-
ment service, and all persons who have
this knowledge are urged to apply for
examination. Practically all persons
who pass the typewriter or stenog-
rapher and typewriter examinations,
and are willing to accept employment
in Washington, D. C., are being ap-
pointed as soon as they attain eligible
ratings.

In Court During Trial for Murder

MRS. BIANCA DE SAULLES.

Mrs. Bianca De Saulles, the Chilean
beauty, is on trial at Mineola, L. I., on
the charge of having murdered her
husband, John L. DeSaulles, who was
once a Yale football star. She shot
her husband to death in his Long Is-
land home last summer because he did
not, or would not, return their 5-year-
old boy to her. The young woman is
of a prominent family of Chile, and
was related to a president of that na-
tion.

**Norway Overrun
By German Spies**

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Nov. 28.—
Norway, during the last half of this
year, has had the same experience of
German methods as the United States
went thru before it entered the war,
spies working everywhere under the
direction of espionage centers in the
neighboring countries, Sweden and
Denmark.

Thanks to the work of the police,
especially in Christiania, many of them
have been caught, some sent to jail
and others expelled from the country.

Several mysterious fires in great in-
dustrial plants and storage houses
have aroused a country-wide suspicion
against every German, Swede and

Finn. During the last half of the year
there have been twenty-one such fires
here, two or three occurring together.
The great store of provisions in Trond-
jem belonging to the British importing
agency, was burned with a loss of sev-
eral million dollars. It proved to be of
incendiary origin. Two canning plants
with great exports for Great Britain
were burned, and a condensed milk
plant with exclusive export trade to
England was destroyed, with more
than a million cans ready for ship-
ment.

Three planing mills in different
parts of the country were burned.
Their output was being used for boxes

and crates for export. The other day
another planing mill in the vicinity of
the government's firearm manufac-
tory at Kongsberg was burned during
the night, and while attention was di-
rected toward this fire a burglar was
detected in the firearm factory. The
press states that German plotters in
this case tried to blow up the govern-
ment factory.

Foreigners have sought, and in some
cases obtained, employment at the gov-
ernment munition plant, and later have
been discovered to be German citizens,
some of them even officers in the Ger-
man army.

The press is warning the people to
look for a criminal spy in every Ger-
man in the country.

In order to keep such undesirable
guests out of the country and prevent
the increasing number of foreigners of
a poor quality from drifting into Nor-
way, a short bill was passed by parlia-
ment forbidding foreigners who have
arrived since August, 1914, to stay
here more than two weeks without a
special license.

**WASHINGTON INDIANS
PROVE PATRIOTIC**

EVERETT, Wash., Nov. 28.—Indians
of the Tulalip reservation near here
were so enthusiastic during the recent
second Liberty Loan drive they would
have invested every dollar they pos-
sessed had they been left to them-
selves. Dr. Charles M. Buchanan, su-
perintendent of the reservation, said
here recently. One Indian woman,
who is rich from the sale of timber, in-
vested \$10,000 in the bonds.

**LITTLE CHILDREN
COMMENCE KNITTING**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—To
prove that American children under-
stand and appreciate the sacrifices
that American sailors and soldiers are
making, many of the little ones in the
Children's hospital here are knitting
for the Red Cross. The children, many
of whom are but 8 and 9 years of age,
are confining themselves mostly to
towels. One tiny boy, who is forced to
lie on his stomach in bed, is said to be
one of the most enthusiastic knitters.

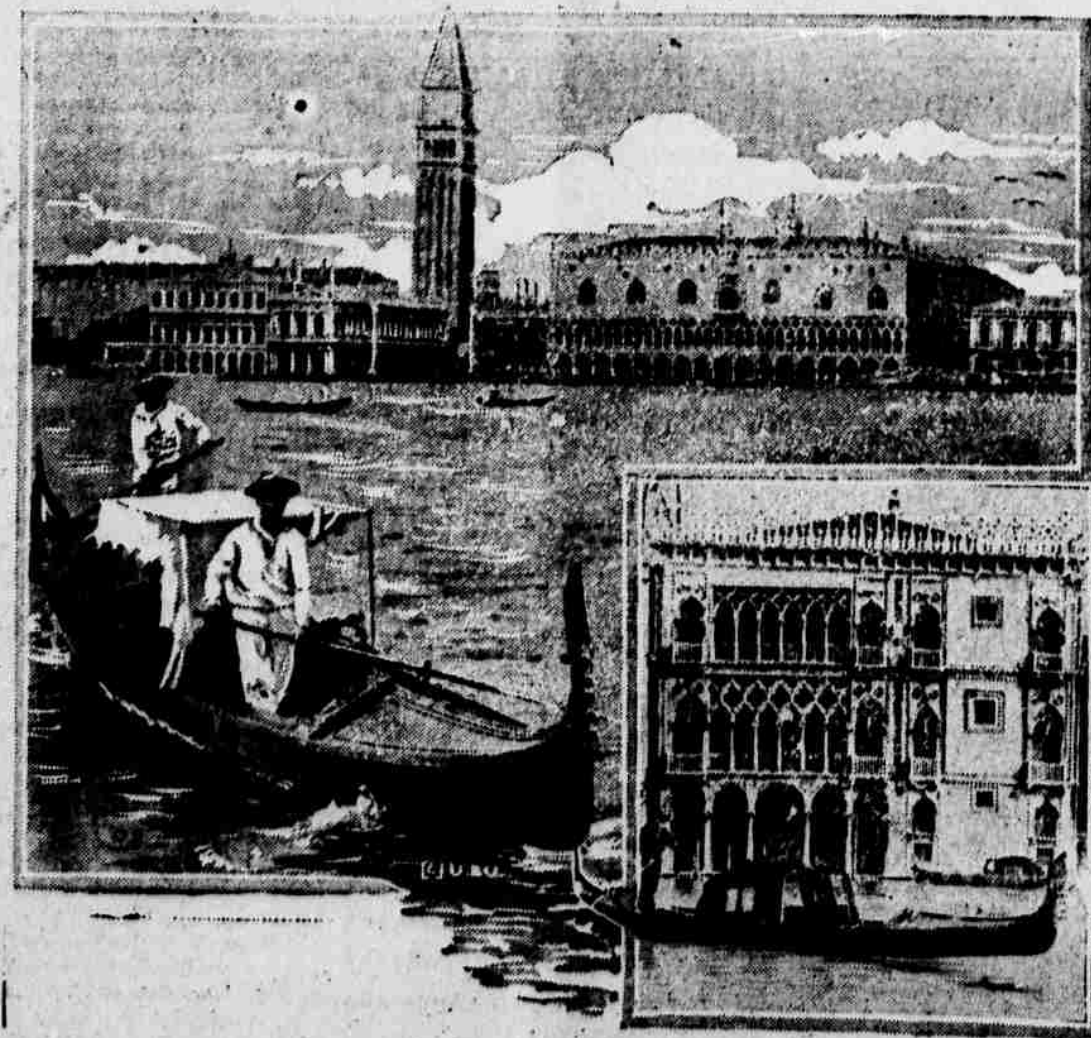
