### PIGEON PRODUCTION

PROVES VERY LUCRATIVE

EUGENE, Dec. 1.—The meat production possibilities of pigeons have proved high in the case of Ira F. Rebmen of this city, who started in the squab industry last January with twenty-two pigeons, including two pairs mated, and now has 200 mated pairs and 100 young birds. In addition to this, Rebmen has marketed nearly a thousand pounds of squab meat, making shipments to Chicago, Seattle, Portland and Montana cities.

The demand for squabs is good at all seasons, according to Rebmen. There is little waste to the birds, and the bones are small and meat solid. Squabs are ready for market at four weeks of age, and sell at 50 cents per pound now.
