**ENEMY FAILS
IN REACHING
OBJECTIVES**

**AIM OF GERMANS TO BREAK
THRU ITALIAN LINES FOR COM-
FORTABLE WINTER QUARTERS
ON PLAINS IS FRUSTRATED**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 12.—
Heavy snowfalls in the rough country
of northeastern Italy are expected to
greatly hamper the Austro-German
armies, according to Rome dispatches,
which told of the failure of the cen-
tral powers to smash the Italian lines,
albeit hundreds of thousands of men
were sacrificed.

These dispatches confirmed previous
reports of a lull after terrific
fighting, when the Germans and Aus-
trians made desperate efforts to gain
their general objective—the plains of
Italy—where it was planned to es-
tablish comfortable winter quarters.
This description of the situation is
given:

"The fierce fighting of the last few
days has subsided into a period of
comparative calm. The superhuman
resistance of the Italians prevented the
Austro-Germans from attaining the
strategical ends of their objective,
albeit they succeeded in obtaining
gains of purely tactical character. The
failure of the enemy attacks is
indicated by the inactivity on the
entire front for three consecutive
days. The invaders have desisted
from attacking positions in the direc-
tion of the Brenna canal on account
of the complete exhaustion of the
forces engaged.

"General Conrad has sacrificed
hundreds of thousands of his best sol-
diers in successive assaults preceded
by unprecedented artillery preparation,
and today the position of the
Austro-Germans, while not improved
by progress made, is, in fact, more
unfavorable to them than at the be-
ginning of the offensive, because of
the difficulties of re-equipping the
troops. The heavy snowfalls of the
season will also aggregate the hard-
ships of the enemy and threaten the
lines of communication.

"It may be stated, therefore, that
the central powers have failed to ob-
tain their general objective, namely,
to break thru our lines into the plains
of Italy, where they expected to find
comfortable shelter during the win-
ter months."

**Perilous Situation
Confronting Allies**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 12.—
Germany has massed on the western
front her greatest army of the war.
Secretary Baker declares in his week-
ly war review, just made public. To
meet this menace, the United States
must speed up its military prepara-
tions, the secretary adds, with a
warning that the enemy is preparing
to put into execution in France plans
he has been maturing since the de-
feat of the Russian armies at Tannen-
berg early in the war.

The peace negotiations with Russia
have permitted the massing of men
on the western front for that purpose.
The review asserts the German
counter offensive on the Cambrai
front has been successful in winning
back less than one-third of the terri-
tory captured by General Byng, and
continues:

"The German parrying thrust, the
most powerful and successful blow
aimed at the British during the past
two and a half years, coming as it did
immediately after the British victory
in the same area, serves to emphasize
the reviewing strength of the Ger-
mans in the west.

"Germany, by leaving only skeleton
divisions in the Russian area, by con-
centrating all available guns, muni-
tions and men in the theater of opera-
tions in the west, has been able to
mass a relatively greater force than
she ever has been able to mobilize in
France in the past.

"The enemy realizes that he finds
himself temporarily in a singularly
fortunate position, and he can be
counted upon to take the utmost ad-
vantage of it.

"The magnitude of the task before
us can be better realized when meas-
ured by the success which the enemy

and anti-pooling laws might be sus-
pended during the war. Others point-
ed out that the commerce commis-
sion's report also carried the sugges-
tion that additional legislation might
be needed, were the government to
decide to take over operation of the
roads.

The president's advisers are divided
in their views just as to what is
necessary to be done. Most of them,
however, have come out for govern-
ment operation, and some of the
strongest supporters of this proposal
declare the executive under the army
appropriation act has power to take
over the roads for operation under an
administrator.

Italy."

says the agreement covers the entire
line from the Baltic to the Black sea,
as well as the region of the Cau-
casus."
