NEW WAR DISEASE

FROM MALNUTRITION

LONDON, Dec. 22.—A new war dis-
ease has made its appearance in Ger-
many, known as "War Dropsy," which
is reviewed at length from the Ger-
man medical journals by the current
British Medical Journal. The cause
of the disease is believed to be under-
feeding or malnutrition. The disease
appeared in Vienna with great sud-
denness. It is stated that the sym-
ptoms are much similar to those of
beriberi.

SECRET TREATY
IS MADE PUBLIC

ALLEGED PACT BETWEEN JAPAN
AND RUSSIA TO KEEP UNCLE
SAM AND JOHN BULL FROM
CHINA, PUBLISHED IN RUSSIA

PETROGRAD, Dec. 22.—A news-
paper here has published the text of
an alleged secret treaty between Rus-
sia and Japan, signed last year, pro-
viding joint action by Russia and
Japan to prevent any third country
from achieving political dominance in
China.

The treaty is supposed to be aimed
to circumvent England and the Uni-
ted States.

SHADY OPERATIONS
BROUGHT TO LIGHT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 22.—
Sensational disclosures in the Federal
Trade Commission's investigation of
the Chicago stockyards shows that
the stockyards company agreed to
pay to J. Ogden Armour and all com-
panies a payment of over 9 per cent
to keep him from moving the yards
from Chicago to some point further
west.

ENGLAND PLANS HUGE STORAGE

LONDON, Dec. 22.—The ministry
of food has formed a section charged
with the organization and encourage-
ment of cold storage facilities. It is
intended to arrange that a three
months' supply of perishable goods
shall be storable at the various ports
of the United Kingdom. The accom-
modation they provide is to be in-
creased by 10,000,000 cubic feet of
space.

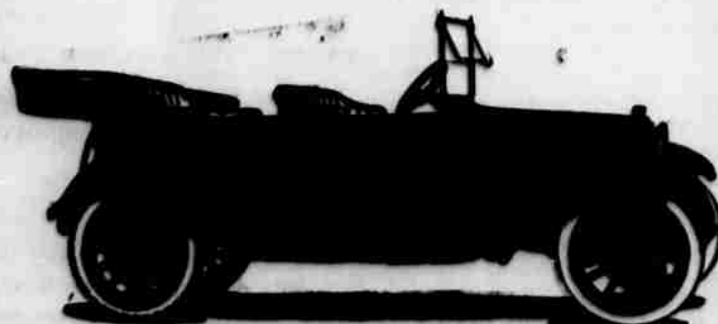

JAPS ADOPT
NEW TACTICS

TOKIO, Dec. 22.—The annual army
maneuvers this fall differed from
those of preceding years in two re-
spects. First, there was some at-
tempt at air fighting, altho only a few
machines were used the work was
sharply done, and for the first time
in Japan.

The other departure was the adop-
tion of German tactics for the concen-
tration of troops by railways. The at-
tacking arm, too, was larger than the
army of defense, and this was an un-
usual feature. The emperor in his
address to the troops pointed out the
necessity for new tactics to meet the
changed conditions in Europe.
