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KAISER TALKS OF CONQUESTS

BOASTS OF WONDERFUL ORGAN-
IZATION OF GERMAN ARMIES
AND DECLARES ENEMY HAS
ACCOMPLISHED NOTHING

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 27.—Emperor
William visited the front north of
Verdun on Friday, according to a Ber-
lin dispatch, and in an address to the
troops thanked them warmly for their
efforts.

"But for the calm and heroic war-
riors on the western front," he said,
"the enormous development of Ger-
man forces in the east and Italy never
would have been possible. The fight-
er in the west has exposed heroically
his body so that his brothers on the
Dvina and the Isonzo might storm
from victory to victory. The fearful
battles on the bloody hills around
Verdun were not in vain; they created
new foundations for the conduct of
the war."

In a speech to the second army on
Saturday Emperor William said:
"It has been a year full of events
for the German army and the German
fatherland. Powerful blows have been
delivered and your comrades in the
east have been able to bring about
greater decisions."

"There has been no man, no officer,
and no general on the whole eastern
front, whenever I have spoken to
them who has not frankly admitted
that they could not have accomplished
what they have if their comrades in
the west had not stood to a man."

"The tactical and strategical con-
nection between the battles of the
Aisne in the Champagne, Artois and
Flanders and at Cambrai and the
events in the east and Italy is so man-
ifest that it is useless to waste words
on it."

"With a centralized direction the
German army works in a centralized
manner. In order that we should be
able to deliver these offensive blows
one portion of the army had to re-
main on the defensive, hard as this is
for the German soldier. Such a de-
fensive battle, however, as has been
fought in 1917 is without parallel. A
fraction of the German army accepted
the heavy task, covering its comrades
in the east unconditionally, and it
had the entire Anglo-French army
against itself."

"By long preparation the enemy
has collected unheard of technical
means and masses of ammunition and
guns in order to make his entry into
Brussels over your front, as he proud-
ly announced. The enemy has achiev-
ed nothing."

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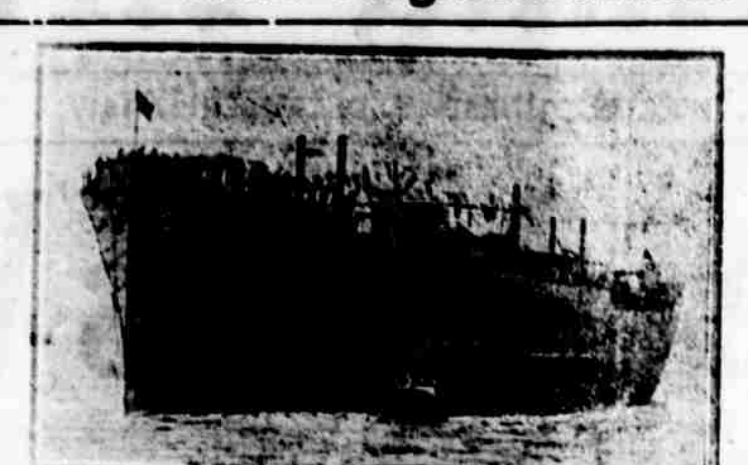
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First Ship of the United States Program Launched

Uncle Sam Will Examine Cupboard

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 27.—
The stage is rapidly being set for Un-
cle Sam's first year-end stock-taking
job, the making of the nation-wide
war emergency food survey, provided
for by the last congress, according to
an announcement by the bureau of
markets, which is conducting the survey.

A copy of the schedule, which is a
four page folder of instructions and
questions as to existing supplies of
food and food materials, has been
started by mail to practically every
dealer in food stuffs, every manufac-
turer of food products, and every
holder of foods in more than family
lots, in the country. Most of the
schedules will be delivered during
the first few days after Christmas,
and should be in the hands of all per-
sons and concerns on the mailing list
by January 2, 1918, according to
Charles J. Brand, chief of the bureau
of markets.

In addition, agents of the bureau of
markets thruout the country have
been furnished with a supply of the
schedules, Mr. Brand announced, and
will distribute them on request to
dealers and other holders of food in
commercial quantities, whose names
are not on the mailing list at Wash-
ington.

Returns must show the stocks on
hand December 31, 1917, and Decem-
ber 31, 1916, and estimates of quan-
tities in transit outward by freight
and express December 31, 1917. The
schedules provide for answers in re-
gard to 86 items, covering more than
100 different foods.

In addition to the survey by mailed
schedules, which will cover most com-
mercial holdings of food in the coun-
try, intensive surveys will be made by
agents in 42 typical counties in vari-
ous parts of the United States, in or-
der that the figures obtained by mail
may be checked. Estimates will be
made also of stocks of foodstuffs on
farms by the bureau of crop esti-
mates.

The complete survey will yield the
most accurate information ever col-
lected in regard to the extent of the
nation's food resources, and is consid-
ered by officials an important step in
the effort to place the country on a
safe footing in so far as the food sup-
ply is concerned.

The figures, it is explained, will
permit the making of intelligent plans
for adequate conservation and distri-
bution of additional food.

Food Administrator
Answers Spreckles

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 27.—
Food Administrator Hoover's state-
ment on the sugar situation, which
he tried unsuccessfully to get before
the senate committee investigating
the sugar shortage, has been made
public by the White House.

It attributes the shortage here to
the movement of sugar from the
western hemisphere to Europe, and
asserts that without the fixing of
prices by agreement sugar would
have been selling for 25 to 30 cents a
pound, and more than \$200,000,000
would have been profiteered from the
American people by this time.

The statement contains the food
administrator's reply to charges
made before the committee by Claus
Spreckles, president of the Federal
Sugar Refining company, that the sug-
ar situation was mismanaged, and
sets forth in detail the administra-
tion's efforts to keep sugar prices

down while supplying large quanti-
ties to the allies.

This committee, of which Senator
Reed is chairman, has not only re-
fused to make the statement a part of
the Congressional Record, but has de-
clined thus far to permit Hoover to
take the stand to answer Spreckles'
charges. When the hearing is re-
sumed tomorrow, however, it is un-
derstood Hoover will be permitted to
tell his story.

At the outset the statement pre-
sents the world sugar situation as it
existed prior to the European war.
The allies then produced much of
their own supplies, and purchased the
remainder from Germany. Before the
war they took only 1,400,000 tons.

"That," says the food administ-
rator, "is the cause of the sugar short-
age, and nothing else."

The statement says the food admin-
istration has handled the situation
with a view to sustaining the morale
of France and England, where the
sugar ration has been extremely low
for months, and at the same time pre-
venting a jump in price to 20 or 25
cents here.

Since the food administration was
created in August, the United States
has exported to the allies 110,358
tons of refined sugar, and in the same
period Cuba has shipped to Europe
256,133 tons of raw product. This, it
is declared, is just the amount of the
shortage in the United States.

Even with these shipments, it is
pointed out, the supply in England
and France has been inadequate. Con-
sumption in England has been reduced
to 24 pounds a year for each person,
and in France to 14 pounds, against
a consumption in America of 55
pounds.

The shortage, the food administ-
ration declares, will continue during
the next year, as it is the duty of the
United States to continue to feed the
allies.

"Next year," he says, "our ship-
ments will be short 250,000 to 300-
000 tons, unless the allies go to Java
for supplies. This amounts to an
economy of about 10 per cent on our
part. If the allies are forced to go to
Java it will require an extra amount

of shipping, which, if used to trans-
port troops, would move 150,000 or
200,000 American soldiers to France.

"If the statement that there will be
an abundance of sugar next year is
believed by the American public, it
will do this country's war efforts in-
calculable harm. The number of
troops we can send across is limited.
If we in our greed and gluttony force
the allies either to reduce their ration
or to go to separate markets after
sugar, we will have done tremendous
damage to our abilities to win the
war."
