Farmers Short Course
Offers Many New Ideas

CORVALLIS, Dec. 28.—Many of
Oregon's most successful farmers
have found that a course in methods
in their special lines immediately fol-
lowing Farmers' Week is the best
possible means of enabling them to
put into effect the plans inspired by
attendance at Farmers' Week. Hence
they remain for a four-week course
in personal instruction. This short
course begins at O. A. C. this year on
Monday, January 7th, and runs till
Saturday, February 2d.

The use of farm tractors and sta-
tionary engines is recognized as one
of the most effective means of solving
the labor shortage problem. So im-
portant is this use in increasing the
grain acreage of Oregon 50 per cent,
as required by the food administra-
tion, that University farmers have been
running their tractors night and day.
To aid those who are taking up the
work to get the best out of their ma-

chines, the tractor school has been
provided.

Eighteen different makes of en-
gines, small and great, are now on
the road to the college to be used in
Farmer Week and Winter Short
Course work. Farmers taking the
course will operate them under the
expert direction, learning how to
handle, care for and repair the vari-
ous makes. They will also have an
opportunity to learn the merits of the
different tractors and purchase ac-
cordingly.

A line of shop work in metal and
wood will go with this course, en-
abling farmers to make such simple
repairs as babbling, sharpening,
welding and mortising. A man of
average skill taking the course will
be able to handle his machine with
best results at least expense.

The other courses in special farm-
ing will be equally complete and
timely.

Women Overdoing at
Chicago Stock Yards

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 29.—
The heaviest food contracts in the his-
tory of the world have been let within
recent days to fourteen of the great
packing houses of the United States.
These large orders have necessitated
night work, as well as the increased
employment of women labor.

Miss Mary MacBowell, director of
the university settlement work at the
Chicago stockyards, also chairman of
the committee on foreign-born women
of the committee on women in indus-

try of the advisory commission of the
Council of National Defense, found on
investigating that many women were
accepting employment in the packing
houses for night work, after their
day of labor at home, with the conse-
quence that some of them obtained
one hour of sleep in the twenty-four.

As a result of her efforts to correct
this situation, the packers have prom-
ised not to employ women with chil-
dren under 6 years of age for night
work.

GERMAN SPY
BEING TRACED

IMPORTANT FACTS HAVE BEEN
BROUGHT TO LIGHT REGARD-
ING MYSTERIOUS "H" WOMAN.
WANTED BY AUTHORITIES

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 29.—John
Knox, who was arrested in connection
with the killing of Herman Jakobich
in a remote part of the San Gabriel
canyon, gave the authorities the iden-
tity of the mysterious "H" alleged
German woman agent, according to
the sheriff.

The woman is a German, whose
husband lives at a mountain camp.
He gave her name, and the officers are
now searching for her.

Knox was arrested in the moun-
tains near a cabin believed to belong
to Schueenberg, the alleged master
spy, held at San Francisco.
A quarrel resulting in Jakobich's
death is said to have resulted with
Knox over the "H" woman, who had
frequently visited them.
