SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 31.—"Jim Hill" mustard, so called from its prevalence along the railroad right of way built across the Northwest by the late railroad magnate, has been found to be a valuable forage crop, according to Y. C. Mansfield of Endicott, Wash., a stock grower.

"We lost thousands of dollars last year," said Mansfield, "when we commenced experimenting with it as a forage plant. Last year we sold \$8,000 worth of sheep that had been raised on these weeds, and all it cost us was the mowing."
