Women Active Behind The Lines in France

BEHIND THE BRITISH LINES IN FRANCE, Dec. 7.—(Correspondence)—Many thousands of French women and girls, ranging in age from 14 to well past 40, are employed by the British army at various kinds of work behind the lines. One line at which they excel all other workers is the painting of camouflage on guns.

In many of the clerical sections of the redoubtable department they work side by side with the uniformed English girls belonging to the "Wrens," the members of Women's Auxiliary Army Corps are called, and in these departments a systematic system of marking has been adopted in order

to facilitate sorting, as most of the French girls have no knowledge of English.

More than 1,000 French women are engaged in the receipts and salvage department, where their work includes the repairing of respirators and other equipment, the scrubbing and renewal of harness and leather materials in an oil bath, all the sorting of recovered cartridges and water bottles.

In the boot and shoe repairing department at one base 1,500 French women are employed in bootmaking and repairing. In the armorer's shops French girls clean, oil and test bayonets. In the wheelwright's shops they clean and straighten belts and paint wagons and traveling kitchens.

In work at plants into the output of the French girls has been found to exceed that of German prisoners by more than 50 per cent.

Jewish Battalion Ready for Palestine

(Associated Press)—The new Jewish battalion of the British army is now organized for its final training period as a bit side to the east of England. Early in the new year it will leave for the Palestine front.

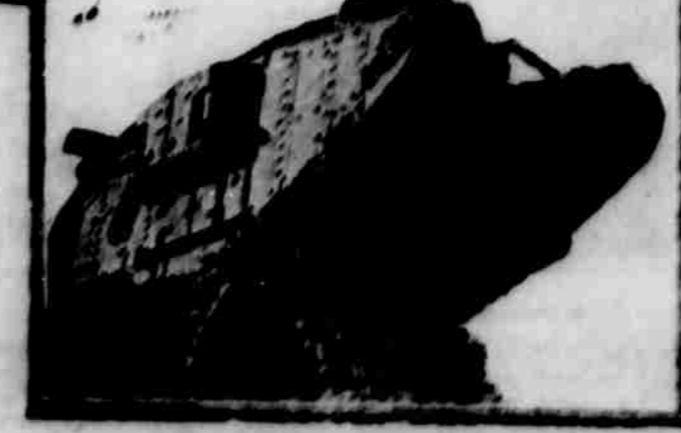
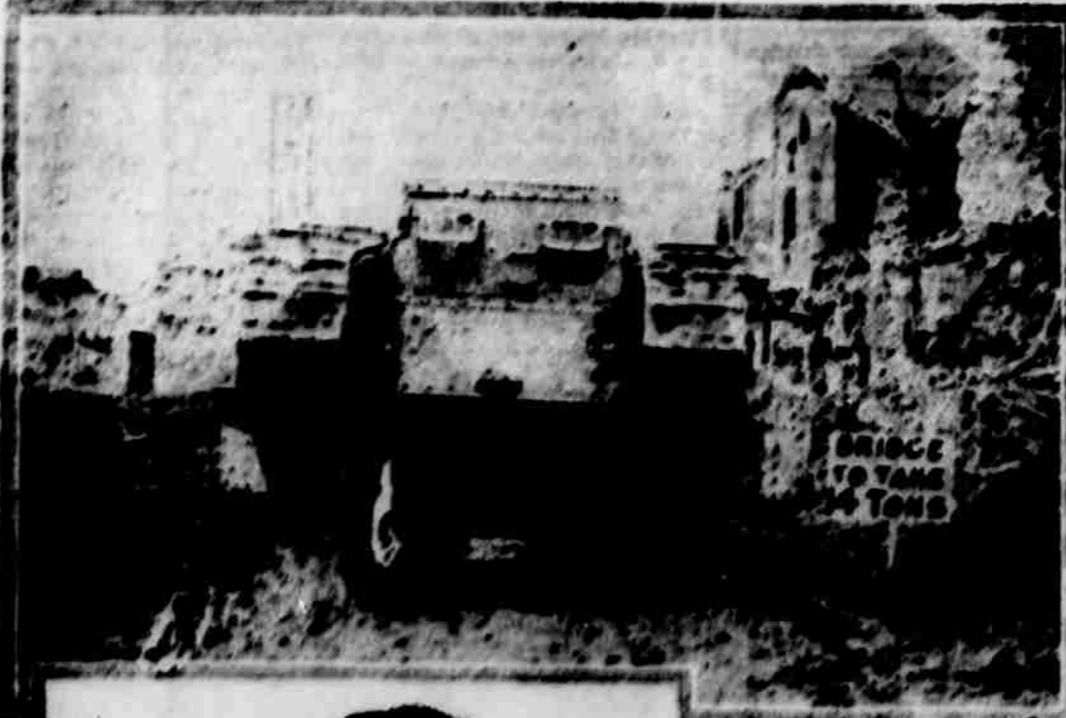
The battalion is under the command of Colonel J. H. Patterson, an Irishman, and a great sea battle is being fought in the days before the war. The recruits are composed of Jewish boys from the United States, who in the past have been known as the Jewish Battalion. After the close of the

last campaign, the Blue Corps was disbanded, but some of its members managed to make their way to England and form the nucleus of the new Jewish battalion.

As at present constituted, about 50 per cent of the Jewish battalion are British born or naturalized. The remainder includes the members of the old Blue Corps, a large number of Russian Jews, and a curious mélange from several allied and neutral countries. The level of physical fitness is very high, particularly in such matters as stunts and evolutions.
