Congress Prepares For Big Job Ahead

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 2.—Congressional leaders are returning to Washington, cutting short their Christmas holidays to prepare for important work to be undertaken when congress reconvenes tomorrow.

They expect to deal promptly with proposed new war legislation, particularly that desired by President Wilson in connection with government operation of the railroads, which the president will outline in a special message.

Committees investigating war activities planned to work throughout this week. Today the senate military committee will hear Major General Crozier, chief of ordnance, in reply to criticisms of Colonel Lewis, inventor of the Lewis machine gun. Secretary Baker also will be afforded an opportunity to make a statement on machine gun questions before the committee closes its ordnance inquiry and returns to clothing and other supplies and cantonment conditions.

Investigation of naval affairs will be resumed tomorrow by the house naval subcommittee inquiry into the delays in the merchant ship building program, with Bainbridge Colby of

the shipping board on the stand before the senate commerce committee.

Preliminary study of railroad problems will proceed today before the senate interstate commerce committee with further examination of Interstate Commerce Commissioner Hall. A contest is in prospect between Senator Pomeroy of Ohio and Smith of South Carolina over the post of committee chairman, vacant as a result of Senator Newland's death.

The senate committee today is investigating sugar and coal shortages and plans to receive the long deferred statement of Food Commissioner Hoover.

When congress reassembles tomorrow both houses will adjourn for the day out of respect to Senator Newlands and Representative Bathrick of Ohio, who have died during the recess.

A final vote on the Walsh-Pittman coal and oil leasing bill is to be taken in the senate Monday after recess. The first vote of the house after recess will be to push thru the administration bill to authorize the secretary of the treasury to purchase \$100,000,000 of federal farm loan bonds, each for two years, a measure which already has passed the senate.

SOUTHERN MILK PRICES SOAR

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2.—An increase of two cents a quart in the price of milk was put into effect here today by the larger distributors, bringing the price up to 14 cents a quart.

Prices of feed, due to the prolonged draught and car shortage, was blamed by an official of the Los Angeles Creamery company. He said dairymen had been losing money and to an alarming extent had been selling their dairy stock to butchers, threatening a milk shortage later.

An increase in the price paid for milk to dairymen, it was hoped, would encourage them to keep their stock and maintain a normal production until winter rains start the grass in pastures.

Bomb Damages the Home of California Governor

After he had delivered at Los Angeles a scathing attack on enemy agents and enemy propaganda in the United States, an attempt was made on the life of Governor William D. Stephens of California at the executive mansion in Sacramento. A bomb was thrown against the building or planted so it exploded, tearing away a part of the rear. The governor was not injured, and all others in the mansion escaped.

Austrian Finances In Critical Shape

ZURICH, Switzerland, Jan. 2.—The rapid inflation of the note issue in Austria-Hungary, which has reached seventeen thousand million crowns and is increasing at the rate of one thousand million per month, is causing great apprehension in financial circles in the dual monarchy. Various remedies are under consideration, such as the payment of government

contractors in war loan stock or non-negotiable treasury bills. The public is also urged to subscribe liberally to the seventh war loan and help the government restrict the note issue.

Der Zeit declares all these measures to be useless, and says there is no longer any possibility of stopping the continual rise in prices and the inflation of the currency.

AIR RAID VICTIMS HONORED

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Persons killed in air raids can have a military funeral if their relatives so desire. In making this announcement the war office says that arrangements may be made for the attendance of troops, with a band, if one is available, and for the loan of a Union Jack to cover the coffin.

STEAMER CALLS FOR HELP

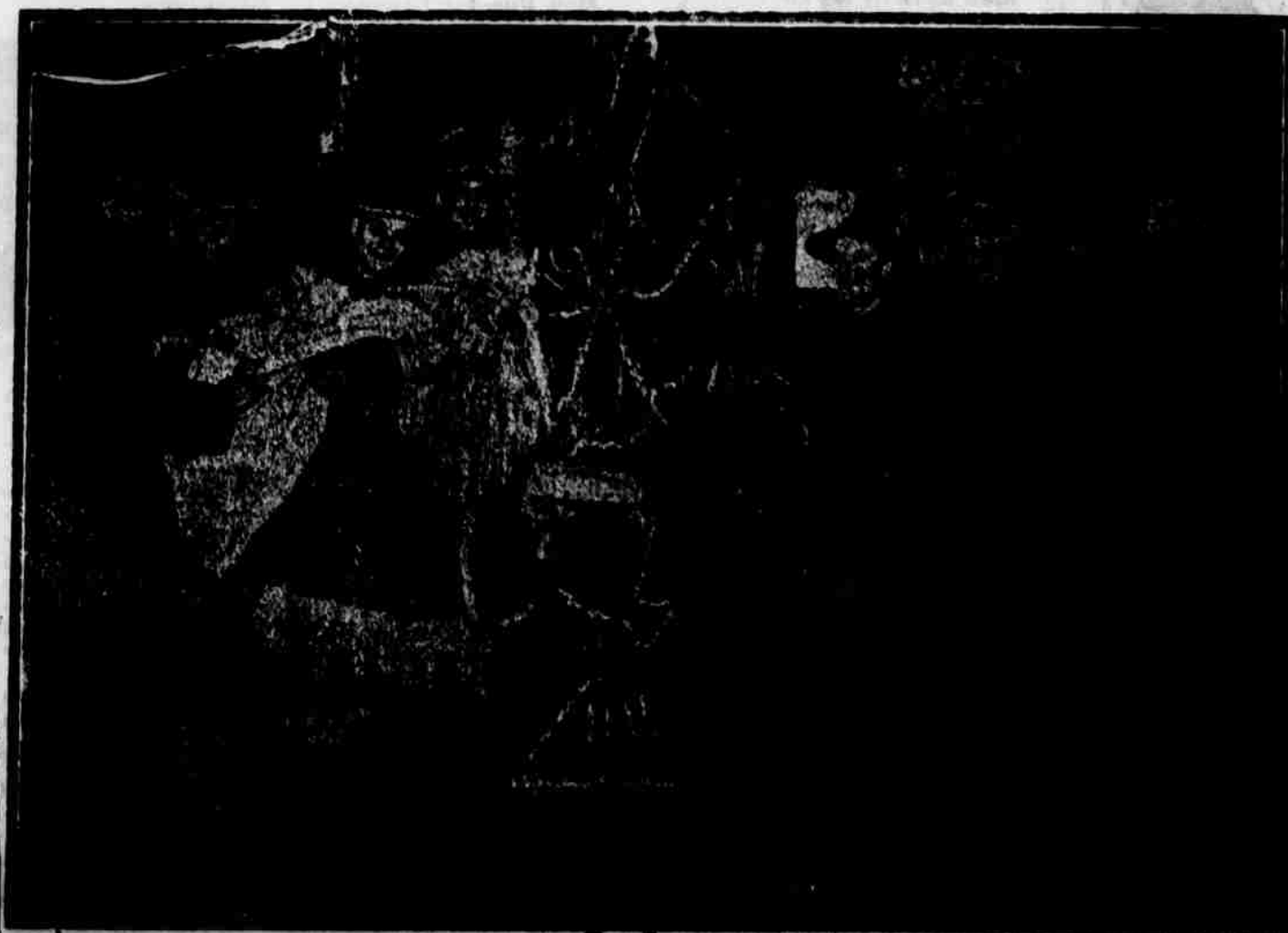
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—An S. O. S. message from the passenger and freight steamer F. A. Kilburn, which
