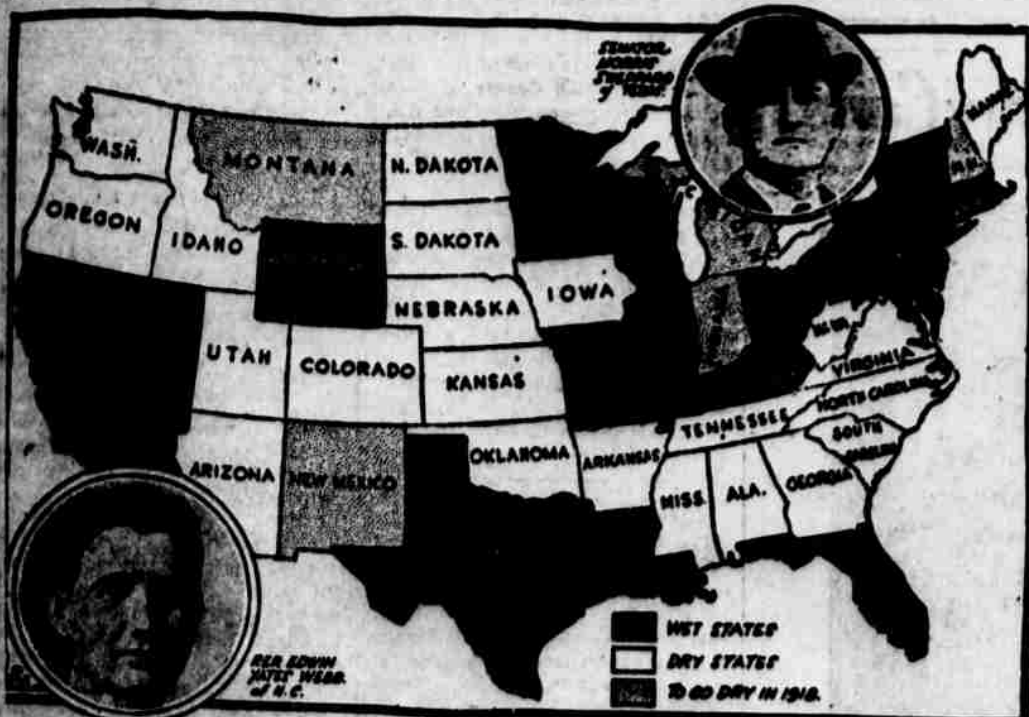


Upon presentation of a recruiting officer of a certificate
by his Local Board to the effect that his class and order num-
ber are so low that he is not within the current quota of his
Local Board, any registrant may enlist voluntarily in the Navy
or Marine Corps, and the latter, upon presentation by the reg-
istrant to his Local Board of a commissioned officer of the
Navy or Marine Corps stating that he has been so enlisted,
such certificate shall be filed with the Questionnaire and the
registrant shall be placed in class V, on the ground that he is
in the Naval Service of the United States.

Where the Great Fight for Constitutional Prohibition Will Have to Be Made



When the house of representatives
passed the prohibition amendment to
the Constitution the other day there
were just twenty-two dry states in
the Union, and five more which had
passed prohibitory laws to take effect
in 1919. Assuming the twenty-seven
states will vote for constitutional
prohibition, also more must adopt the
amendment to make it part of the
Constitution of the United States.
The states in the twenty-one wet
column are: Washington, Oregon, Idaho,
Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma,
Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana,
Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Vermont,
New Hampshire, Maine, and Massachusetts.

BIG AUSTRIAN TRAIN WRECK

MANY PASSENGERS REPORTED
KILLED WHEN TRAIN CATCHES
FIRE WHILE TRAVELING AT
HIGH RATE OF SPEED

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 2.—The wreck-
ing of the passenger train near Sam-
bor, in Galicia, forty miles southwest
of Lemberg, causing many deaths, is
reported.

the emergency brakes could not be
operated.
