

Canadian Officers to Tour Oregon

Major Frank B. Edwards and Captain T. J. LeBlanc, returned wounded Canadian officers from the battle ground in Western France, will speak at a public demonstration at the Public Auditorium Friday afternoon, January 9th, under the auspices of the Portland war emergency council, the Multnomah county unit of the state council of national defense. The two officers were repatriated to their native land, both seriously wounded, after a service of two years in the trenches. They have been detailed by General Leckie, commanding Eleventh Division of Canadian forces, at Victoria, B. C., to make a tour of Oregon, speaking in every county seat in the state under the auspices of the state council of defense. Bruce Dennis, director of the work of the organization in this state will arrange the itinerary.

ters, so that they might pass upon the qualifications of the person who was to look after this department, and the sample sent by Dr. Stone was given the approval of the inspectors, and a certificate was issued to Dr. Stone, and she is now fully qualified to undertake the management of this department.

The work room has been open every day. It is comfortable and commodious, and well provided with materials and machines, and is under the management of Mrs. Addie Walker.

Just recently we have been given a regular allotment of supplies to send forward. Previous to the receipt of this allotment we were told to make whatever we could. Our allotment consists of one box per month of hospital supplies, which box is to be made up of approximately seventy-five pairs of pajamas and fifty bed shirts. In addition to the above fixed allotment, the chapter is asked to knit all that we can, and rush shipment of knitted goods forward as fast as possible. We are also asked to get out all of the surgical dressings that we can.

The knitting department handles the issuing out of the yarn which we receive, instructs as to methods of working the articles, and carries with it the responsibility of getting back the completed articles, which is quite important, as people sometimes have them finished, and fail to send them in. This department is in charge of Miss Head, assisted by Miss Reith.

Since your last meeting the following shipments have been made to the Red Cross supply station:

Shipment No. 1—100 pairs of pajamas.

Shipment No. 2—85 pairs of pajamas, 120 nightgowns, 50 pairs of bed socks.

Shipment No. 3—124 Christmas presents.

Shipment No. 4—122 Christmas presents.

Shipment No. 5—100 pairs of pajamas.

Shipment No. 6—50 sweaters, 80 pairs of socks, 16 mufflers, 25 wristlets.

We have completed in the work room about enough to make two-thirds of a box for another shipment.

In acknowledging the receipts of our shipments there were no comments on the quality of the workmanship on our sewed garments, and all of them were accepted as being perfectly all right. We, however, received the following rather unfavorable comments regarding the knitted goods, which comments are set forth in the following letter:

"The sweaters were nearly all very good; also the mufflers, but the socks were not so good."

"As some knitters have found difficulty in making satisfactory socks over the directions given in A. R. C. 400, we have thought it wise to get out some new instructions, and will very shortly send some to you, which we trust you will distribute freely. These new instructions for making the Kitchener toe are so plain that we think no one will have any difficulty in following them. The Kitchener toe makes a perfect toe, and we advise all knitters to use it."

"All socks should be fastened in pairs, at the heel only."

The establishment of the Junior Auxiliary, which has been urged by the main chapter, will be begun in Klamath Falls right after January 1st, and Mr. Bowman of the high school has accepted the chairmanship and the entire charge of this branch of our endeavors.

We were called upon by the National chapter for 346 presents for the soldiers, which allotment was sent. The funds for providing them had to be secured outside of ordinary chapter resources and to accomplish this a dancing party was given at the Elks hall, and also a party was given by Mrs. E. B. Hall at the White Pelican hotel. The results of the money obtained will be a part of the treasurer's report, but it might be well to say here that these two entertainments provided more than enough funds to take care of our allotment, and we should be extremely grateful to Mrs. Hall, Mrs. Fred English and Mrs. Schallack for their earnest assistance in this matter.

We were allotted 3,500 members to be secured in the Christmas membership drive, and Mr. W. O. Smith was appointed to take full charge of this drive, and the able and masterly way in which he conducted it shows in the results, as the Klamath chapter went "over the top" with more than its allotment.

We anticipated establishing branches at several points, and all of the points talked with decided, after consideration that it would be better to operate as part of this chapter, and let us provide them with supplies, materials, etc., and for them to turn in their funds to this chapter. Those who are co-operating with us in this way are Bonanza, Big, Lorella, Malin, Mt. Lake, Merrill, Klamath Agency and Fort Klamath. The Klamath Agency branch, however, has just recently made inquiries again about the establishment of an auxiliary.

Entertainments have been given in several places for the Red Cross, the results of which will be set forth in the treasurer's report.

I believe that this covers the activities of the chapter since your last meeting, on September 30th.

Wilson Goes Before Congress Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 8.—Coal trains have gone forward under new government orders based on the belief of Director General McAdoo that railway congestion, rather than actual shortage, is responsible for the fuel famine in many districts.

Upon receipt of reports that hundreds of loaded coal cars were stalled on sidings, all existing priority orders for the entire country were suspended by Robert S. Lovett, priority director of the war industries board, on recommendation of the director general. This is expected to result in quicker

movement of the entire mass of congested freight.

President Wilson, it was learned, will go before congress tomorrow to present his recommendations for legislation to make government operation fully effective, and to provide for compensation of the carriers and legislation which has already been drawn will be introduced immediately after his address. Some officials think there will be a vigorous fight over the question of whether the legislation should be effectively only for the period of the war and a limited time thereafter, or should remain in force until specifically repealed or modified by congress.

German Lieutenant Gets Heavy Sentence

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 3.—Lieutenant Wilhelm von Brincken, former military attaché of the German consulate general here, pleaded guilty to conspiring to foment revolution against British rule in India, for the purpose of embarrassing the English in their conduct of the war. He stated in court that his reason for making this plea was that the less come out, the better it would be for Germany.

Lieutenant von Brincken already was under sentence to prison terms of

one and two years, running concurrently. These were imposed after his conviction on charges of conspiring to violate neutrality laws and violating the Sherman anti-trust law, the violation of neutrality also bringing a fine of \$10,000.

The maximum penalty for the charge of conspiring to foment revolution is two years imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000. An indictment charging use of the mails to incite murder and arson still pends against the former consular agent.

Kaiser Paints Future In Bright Rosy Tints

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 3.—Berlin reports that Emperor William has addressed the following New Year order to the army and navy:

"A year of heavy and important battles has closed. The gigantic battles which raged from spring to fall on Belgian and French soil were decided in favor of your glorious arms. In the east the offensive spirit of our armies, by powerful blows, achieved great successes. Our arms there are now at rest. Brilliant victories in a few days destroyed the Italian offensive preparations of years."

"In co-operation with my army, my fleet has again proved its efficiency by

daring enterprises. The submarines are unwaveringly performing their difficult and effective work. Filled with pride and admiration, we survey the heroic band of our colonial troops."

"The German people in arms has thus everywhere, on land and sea, achieved great deeds. But our enemies still hope, with the assistance of new allies, to defeat you, and then destroy forever the world position won by Germany in hard endeavor. They will not succeed. Trusting in our righteous cause and in our strength, we face 1915 with firm confidence and iron will. Therefore, forward with God to fresh deeds and fresh victories."

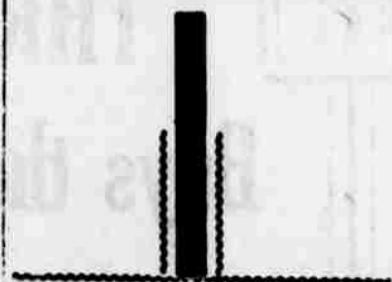
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Kaiser Saluting the Head of the Mohammedan Church
