Miss Elizabeth Houston will return tonight from Portland and Eugene, where she has been spending the holidays.

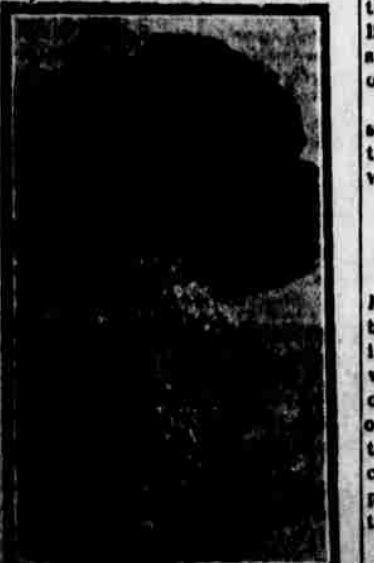
Miss Cox, teacher in the Medford schools, has returned to her home after spending a week here as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Bowman.

PRISONERS IN COUNTY JAIL MAY  
WORTH OF FOOD DURING  
MONTH OF DECEMBER—MOSTLY  
BOOTLEGGERS

That the local officers of the law are not paid for doing nothing is indicated in the statement of Sheriff Humphrey today that the cost of feeding the prisoners in the county jail last month was in excess of \$300.

This little board bill was accumulated from twenty different culprits, who were held for all or a part of the time.

Most of the men are held on charges of bootlegging. Five are charged as the star boarders at the sheriff's office. There are accommodations for about eight men in the jail, and when more than this number are confined there it becomes very uncomfortable.

All of the I. W. W. arrested last summer and held on charge of vagrancy have served their terms and been released.

CLASH NEAR

foot will be taken up as fast as it is made available to the public.

There is also the immense tract of the tule marsh lands of the Lower Klamath Lake, which is at last to be subjected to reclamation, following the many years of weary waiting and litigation. It is believed that 40,000 acres here will be ready for pasturage next summer.

This will later be put under irrigation from some source, probably by the United States reclamation service.

A large tract of several thousand acres beyond what is known as Adams Point is to come under a pumping plant in the Malin section this year. This tract was purchased not long ago by William Dalton of the Lakeside Land company. It can be economically irrigated by pumping from the government canal, and arrangements are already under way for this work. There are several other pumping projects in that vicinity, where the water is expected to be pumped this year.

Farmers in the eastern part of the county, near Bonanza, have one of their new projects almost completed, and others will be ready for the water before the time arrives to use it. These places enumerated are simply those where the reclamation is assured, not counting in the White Lake project, the Upper Langell Valley project and several others that are probable. Along the big Upper Lake several new areas are to be added this year. The Modoc Point irrigation project is to be increased on the Klamath reservation.

In addition to all this, should the big appropriation already recommended to congress for the United States reclamation project here go thru, the development in an agricultural way will be hard to realize. There will also be a substantial increase in the lumbering industry, which has been advancing so rapidly here during the past two years. Every longer than can possibly be secured will be put in the woods, and the lumber sawed as fast as obtained.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 2.—The federal trade commission will investigate the high price of shoes and other leather goods.

Announcement has been made that Commissioner Davies will direct the probe, much information for which he has developed thru the meat investigation.

Action was determined upon as a result of "exceedingly high prices," the people are forced to pay for shoes. It is alleged "unusually large stocks of hides and leather are now on hand and that tanneries, leather factories and shoe factories are operating far short of their capacity."
