MORE CASH IS ASKED FOR SHIPS

LARGE APPROPRIATION ASKED BY CHAIRMAN OF SHIPPING BOARD—INCREASED AUTHORITY IS REQUESTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 5.—Chairman Hurley of the shipping board has asked congress for \$32,000,000 in addition to the \$165,000,000 heretofore asked for the next fiscal year.

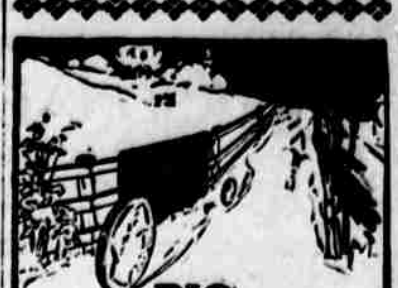

Upon presentation to a recruiting officer of a certificate by his Local Board to the effect that his claim and order number are so low that he is not within the current quota of his Local Board, any registrant may enlist voluntarily in the Navy or Marine Corps, and the officer, upon presentation by the registrant to his Local Board of a commissioned officer of the Navy or Marine Corps stating that he has been so enlisted, such certificate shall be filed with the Questionnaire and the registrant shall be placed in class V, on the ground that he is in the Naval Service of the United States.

At present there is a great demand for men for the U. S. Marine Corps; height 64 to 74 inches, weight 125 pounds upward in proportion.
