English Peer Is Very Optimistic

LONDON, Jan. 5.—"It may be a vain belief on my part, but I hold it very strongly, that the United States and ourselves, two great cousin nations, are even in themselves in a position to bring about the fulfillment of the pledges that we have given." This was one of the assertions made by Sir Edward Carson, minister without portfolio, in the British cabinet, at a meeting here for the purpose of launching a society to promote closer relations with Roumania. Altho speaking under the shadow of the news of an armistice on the Roumanian front, Sir Edward declared that the entente allies would continue in their determination to carry out their duty towards Roumania. "I know of no end to this war that is possible without maintaining the rights of Roumania and Serbia, just as much as the rights of Great Britain and her empire," said Sir Edward. "I repeat the determination of his majesty's government that we will go on to the end with unity until we have attained the objects with which we entered into the war. With our help, Serbia, Roumania and Greece, the most natural alliance in the whole work, ought to build up a fabric which will make not only for the liberty and life of their own people, but will greatly help in the solution of the problems that will arise in the Near East."

Income Tax Inspector James S. Hogg has secured office quarters during his stay in Klamath Falls at room 311, Willits building, and will be at that place during business hours each day to advise those who will fall under the income tax regarding the details of the new system.

New Rural Route Has Been Designated

In response to a number of inquiries which have come to the Herald office regarding the exact route of the new rural mail delivery service, the following description of the route is given.

Starting at the postoffice in Klamath Falls, the carrier will go east on Main street, past Big Basin Lumber company, to Mills Addition; south on Main street, Mills Addition to White avenue; east to Martin avenue; north to Applegate avenue; east to Mitchell avenue; south to White avenue; east to Washburn avenue; thence south to section corner 35-34-4-3.

South on road past slaughter house 3.5 miles; west 1 mile, Miller Hill school house; south 3.5 miles; west 1 mile; south 3.5 miles, thru edge of Midland, to SW corner section 4; east to SW corner section 3, 3 miles; south 1.75 miles; east 1.5 miles; south 1/2 mile; east 1/2 mile to SE corner Section 3, Matney. North on main Merrill road 3 miles to Mac's store; west 1 mile; north 1 mile; west 1.25 miles to south line of section 34; north 3 miles, west 1/2 mile to west line of section 16; north to Lakeview road and to postoffice.

Total length of route, 30.5 miles. Service will be three times a week, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Patrons must erect the boxes, only the standard metal boxes approved by the department, so that the carrier can deliver the mail without getting out of his vehicle. Where two families use the same box written agreement to that effect must be filed with the postmaster.

An examination is announced for January 12th for a carrier for this route. Applicants should secure the necessary blanks at once from the secretary of the local civil service board at the postoffice.
