WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 7.—Sanction has been given to Senator Gallinger's bill allowing the importation of Chinese laborers during the war, he said in a statement. He said some Pacific Coast newspapers and individuals, as well as others in the East, approved of the scheme. "It is said there are 17,200 Chinese farmers now in forty-five states," he declared. "The idea is not to import coolies, but genuine farmers, and that only during the war and under strict restrictions."

Shasta Route to Lose Two Trains

REDDING, Calif., Jan. 7.—Additional important changes in the Southern Pacific passenger service on the Shasta-Portland route will go into effect Friday, January 18th, according to reports in railroad circles in Redding. Two trains will be taken off entirely and minor changes made in the running time of the other passenger trains. The trains to be discontinued are the Shasta Limited, Nos. 11 and 12. This is caused by the government order curtailing passenger service. The cutting out of these two trains will release twenty-one large engines, which will be devoted to freight service.

Interesting Problems At Coming Convention

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 7. How to eat more now in order that there may be more to eat next year will be one of the topics brought before the annual meeting of the American National Livestock Association, which opens here January 14th, according to stockmen, who plan to attend the meeting. The plan, which touches the consumer in that it would substitute a "porkless" day for the present "meatless" Tuesday, is based on the declaration that unless the demand for beef and mutton for domestic consumption is increased soon there will be a shortage of these meats the spring and summer of next year. The stockmen assert that while a normal or enlarged number of steers and sheep are being fattened for market this winter, if there should be no increase in prices, or if the present prices should not be maintained, fewer would be fattened next winter, with a corresponding decrease in the number sold for slaughter. Continuance of the present decreased consumption, due to "meatless" days, they declare, will mean a glut of the market and lowering of prices. Another subject which the stockmen expect to consider is the possibility of changes in the transportation system due to the taking over of the railroads by the government. Reports from the market committee, touching on the investigation of the neat industry being made by the federal trade commission; discussion of national forest use for grazing purposes, the 640-acre homestead bill, the livestock industry and the war, and other subjects, many of them technical, also are to be presented at the meeting.

Germans Are Evading The Russ Proposals

PETROGRAD, Jan. 7.—The work of the commission which is dealing with prisoners is proceeding slowly. The Russian delegates claimed the right to send any publications they desired to Russian prisoners in Germany and to socialists in the central empires. They also demanded unrestricted direct telegraphic communication with representatives of the socialist parties in the enemy countries. The German delegates replied they were unauthorized to make an agreement on this point. The Russians demanded the creation of a special commission to inquire into the deportation of Polish workmen for employment in privately owned factories in Germany. To this demand the Germans responded they had not been authorized to take up the question. The Russians thereupon asked for further instructions from the council of people's commissioners. WEALTHY OLD MAN DIES LIKE PAUPER DENVER, Jan. 7.—John Knowles, 47 years old, who died in the county hospital December 20th last, friendless and alone, and apparently penniless, was the owner of an estate which local real estate men value at \$250,000. A real estate man with whom Knowles once had been associated, started the search which brought to light Knowles' holdings.

LUXBURG DECLARED A LUNATIC

MEDICAL AUTHORITIES AT BUENOS AIRES DECIDE THAT FORMER GERMAN ENVOY HAS BEEN INSANE FOR DECADE

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 5.—Count Luxburg, German envoy of "spudios verseite" fame, is now insane, and has been "eccentric for a decade," according to reports of medical authorities who have had him under observation. The finding was after prolonged and careful study of the German minister now held in an internment camp by a number of reliable medical authorities. The report said their information was that Luxburg had been acting queerly for a number of years.

Several weeks ago it was reported that the belief among the Germans was that the ex-minister was a victim of dementia. At that time he was under observation.

SEARCH IS MADE FOR MEANEST BOY

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—The meanest boy in the United States is sought by the Chicago Boys' Brotherhood republic, to be used in an experiment to prove that bad boys are the products of society and environmental influence. A committee of the organization plans to leave here February 1st on a tour of twelve of the largest cities in search of the 100 per cent bad boy, who will be brought to Chicago to live with members of the organization. "In six weeks we will turn him into a 100 per cent good boy," said one member, in explaining the plan.

NORWEGIAN SHIP LOSSES ARE HEAVY

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Last year 367 Norwegian vessels, with an aggregate tonnage of 566,000 were sunk, an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen reports. Since the beginning of the war 215 Danish ships, with a total tonnage of 224,000 have been sunk and 224 Danes have been killed.
