TIMES NUMBER OF DEATHS

The number of deaths in and around Klamath Falls have been only about one-third of the births, according to the records shown by Health Officer Dr. Warren Hunt. The records here are kept for the city of Klamath Falls and for the precincts of Swan, Algoma, Pine Grove, Mt. Laht, the northwest corner of Poe Valley and Dairy.

In this district there have been 166 births and only 53 deaths during the year. Ninety-five of the births are recorded for Klamath Falls and twenty-seven of the deaths. Out of the total number of deaths seven were very young infants.

PLANT FOR PAVING

burn hospital, beginning at Klamath, down Fifth via city hall to Oak, out Oak to Southern Pacific depot; Spring street from the Southern Pacific depot to Martin Bros. flour mill at Sixth; Ninth from Klamath avenue to Oak, Tenth from Main to connect with pavement at Upham are contemplated projects for the season of 1918.

Lee's plan was discussed at some length by the council members.

Another matter which was brought up was the neglect of city residents to conform to the health rules of the city. A number of incidents of rank carelessness where the sanitary conditions were such that the health of people in the surrounding neighborhood was endangered were cited, and it was the evident desire of the council to get behind the city health officer in eradicating these places of contamination.

The question of allowing the jitneys to hold their stands on Main street during the muddy season was brought up and discussed. It was pointed out that under present arrangements the jitneys in coming from their stands just off of Main street drag great quantities of mud onto the pavements with their chains. The matter was finally left to the discretion of the police department.

The matter of auto speeding on the city pavements, especially between the business section and the Southern Pacific depot at train time, was strongly censured. The police were ordered to take all such speeders promptly into custody in the hope of putting an end to this practice.

Three deeds to the Municipal railroad right of way were presented and accepted by the council. A permit

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was granted to E. H. Dunham to remodel his garage on Sixth street.

A considerable portion of the meeting was devoted to the allowing of bills, the largest of these being one of \$13,000 to Robert E. Straborn for railroad construction on the new Municipal railroad.
