## Signs of Stone Age Days Near Albany

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 12.—The recent high water in the Willamette has washed away a portion of the bank of the river two miles above Albany, leaving exposed some fire beds of the early dwellers of the Willamette Valley. J. G. Crawford, an Albany naturalist, who has gathered a large collection of relics of prehistoric days in the Willamette Valley, asserts that the builders of these fire beds came here soon after the formation of the land. They came so soon, in fact, that grass was used for fuel, for the charcoal found between the rocks is of too fine a texture for wood.

Some of the beds found were broken, while others were perfect. They measured from four to eight feet in diameter, and are composed of flat stones the size of a man's fist. The black and brick colored rocks leaves no doubt as to the purpose for which they were used.

The narrowest part of the place where these relics were found is now

but thirty feet wide, while Crawford remembers the time when it was 150 feet wide. Each year a little more is washed away.

Crawford has made a study of the prehistoric relics hereabouts for many years, and states that what are referred to many times as Indian graves and implement are actually the articles of the stone age. Many mounds have been uncovered in various parts of Linn county, and the remains of the ancient people and their tools and objects of worship have been secured. All are of a type different from any known to have been used by the earliest Indians. Some of the skeletons which Mr. Crawford has unearthed resemble those of the modern African, while it is generally believed that the Indian is Asiatic.

Some of Crawford's specimens, including stone utensils, symbols of Phallic worship, and work in copper, are not duplicated in any museum in America.
