Japanese Wages On a Very Low Basis

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—A locomotive engineer receives 50 cents a day and a primary school teacher receives \$15.50 a month in Japan, according to A. Natsunos, member of a party of Japanese statisticians which visited here recently after a tour of the United States. The average newspaper or magazine writer does not receive over \$23 a month, while the average monthly income of a Tokyo doctor is \$50, according to Natsunos.
