Bad Accident On Railroad At Houston

HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 14.—Ten to fourteen persons are dead and twenty more injured as a result of an accident here today, when the passenger train en route from Houston to Dallas split at the switch at Hammond.

The pallbearers were W. G. Dalton, Oscar Shive, Austin Hayden, Leslie Rogers, Will Houston and Will Baldwin.

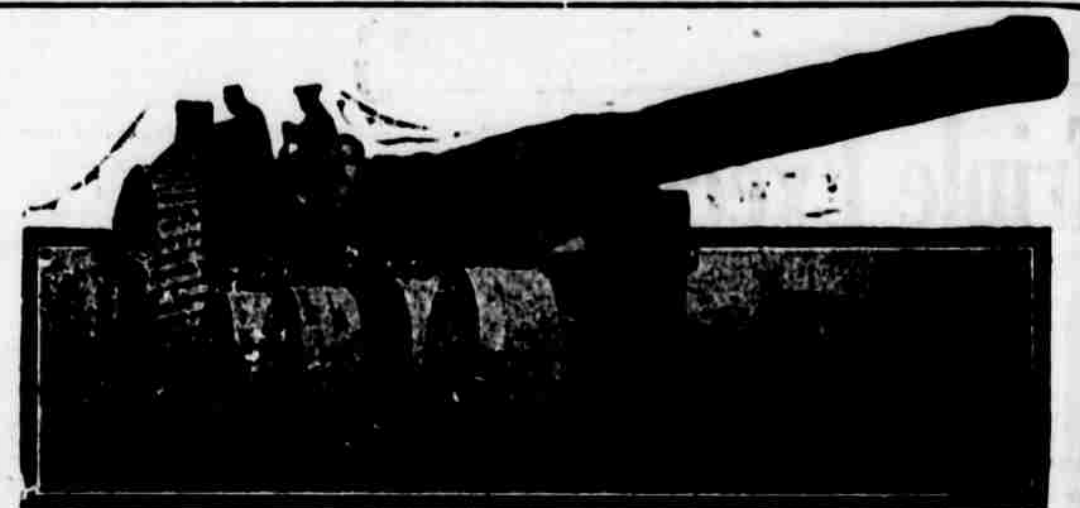
UNCLE SAM MAY TAKE SAILING VESSELS
