Uncle Sam Makes Big Export Record

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—German submarines were unable to prevent Uncle Sam from making a record for exports during the eleven months ending November 30th. It has been announced by the department of commerce.

The total increase for this period, as compared with the corresponding eleven months of the preceding year was \$669,000,000. Exports of crude materials reached a total of \$467,000,000, an increase of \$17,000,000; foodstuffs, \$1,100,000,000, an increase of \$226,000,000; and manufactures, \$2,500,000,000, an increase of \$455,000,000.

Wool and hides valued at \$42,000,000 were exported.

New Plan Endorsed to Settle Labor Troubles

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 12.—A plan having the endorsement of the union and employers alike for the elimination of disturbances in war time has been established in Montana across the efforts of the Montana Employers' Association. This plan has been presented to President Wilson and Governor S. V. Stewart of Montana, and it is to be submitted to the United States department of labor.

At Great Falls, after a trial of the plan, the unions recently gave a sanction, to which the employers were invited as guests. The plan worked in Butte until that city was invaded by the Industrial Workers of the World agitators during the mine troubles last summer, when it was interrupted. It has since been re-established.

The crux of the plan is the adjusting of wages for a year ahead. This is arranged by an agreement which either side may abrogate at the end of the year on a thirty days' notice.

If differences arise which threaten a disturbance at the end of the period covered in the agreement, such differences are submitted to a disinterested local board appointed by both the employers and the workers.

So far it has not been found necessary to call in any higher authority than this local board. But the plan provides for a supreme body of six members, three to be selected by General Congress and three by the National Employers' Association, for the final settlement of all disputes that fail of settlement in the regional boards. This national board is essentially an appellate board, to which exceptions to the findings of the regional board may be referred for final and binding adjudication.

Montana unions and employers are said to be so satisfied with the working of the plan that they are renewing the yearly agreements.

Enemy Says America Is Now Out of War

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 12.—The semi-official Norddutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin published a report from Washington that the United States is sending 50,000,000 bushels of wheat to Europe, and adds:

"This is a heavy blow to the entire cause. Short of rhetorical flourishes, it means that America has decided not to appear on the European battle front for an indefinite time. What moved President Wilson to this change of front, which is the most important development in American war policy?"

The newspaper attributes it partly to the achievements of the German submarine, partly to internal causes, and especially to growing pacifism and friction with Japan.

It continues: "The last hope of the entire has gone. It will inevitably cause deeper depression in France, whose bread ration may be increased slightly, but for whose war-weary troops there is now no hope of relief."

Belgians Executed In Great Numbers

LONDON, Jan. 12.—Word has been received here at the Belgian official headquarters of fifty-eight more official executions in Belgium. This brings the number of Belgians executed since January, 1917, to 170, among whom were at least two women, three girls from 16 to 16 years, and several youths under 20. All the executed Belgians were accused by the Germans to be guilty of spying, and in many cases arrest, condemnation and execution took place within three or four days, and there were no serious inquiry could have been made.

Under the rule of the late governor general, von Bissing, 140 executions took place in one year, according to the German official reports. Governor General von Falkenhayn has increased this record three-fold, and he ceased publishing the names of the victims in order that they could not be identified as martyrs by their compatriots. As a further precaution, the executed persons have been buried inside the prison walls.

WANT STABLE GOVERNMENT

FORT COLLINS, Colo., Jan. 12.—Whatever effect the Russian revolution and counter revolution may have on the war, it has brought to the United States also new candidates for citizenship from one family to Larimer County.

John H. Duines, a farmer near here, tired of being a subject of a different government every few days, and so did George, Henry L., Peter, Adam A. and William Duines and Jacob Maher, Henry Duines and David Scherer, all sons or sons-in-law of Duines. They appeared recently at the office of the clerk of the United States district court, and applied for naturalization papers, renouncing the "priced rulers of Russia."
