Disaster In Guatemala Wrecks All the Houses

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15.—The utter devastation wrought by the earthquake at Guatemala Christmas day and the three days following was described by three refugees who have arrived by steamer from the stricken city. The refugees are Mrs. George Fisher of San Francisco, William E. Manlove, a wholesale drygoods merchant of Los Angeles, and Paul C. Erb, representative of the Petroleum Products company.

Guatemala can be re-occupied without rebuilding," Manlove said. "The Banco International building, the finest in the city, was wrecked completely. The president's country house was destroyed, as was the country home of Don Louis Herrata, minister of exterior relations. He was living in a garage when I last saw him."

"OPEN FACE PIE" ARE LATEST HOOVER STUNT

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 15.—"Open-faced" pies are being advertised at the local restaurants on wheatless days as a part of the Hoover food administration campaign. Instead of using flour for making pastry dough which covers the filling of the pie, the bakers have agreed to eliminate this top cover and use graham flour for the bottom and crust. Many restaurants have refused to serve any form of pastry except that made entirely from non-wheat flours on wheatless days.

Winter Will Delay Big German Drive

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—Winter has settled down in earnest over all the important war fronts, and beyond artillery actions, which are being carried out over very limited sections, there has been little fighting either in the west or in the east.

Only patrol encounters are reported along the British lines and artillery action at two points on the French front. In Italy the terrific artillery and infantry fighting has given way to aerial warfare, which, however, tho it is spectacular, has little direct bearing on the progress of the campaign when confined to combats between individuals or squadrons.

For nearly a month now the front in France and Belgium has been almost snowbound.

Thus the long-awaited German offensive, with the heavy reinforcement

ments which Germany transferred from the Russian front to the west, has been delayed for weeks, if not possibly for months.

A meeting of the crown council at Berlin is reported by the Lokal Anzeiger, composed of Field Marshal von Hindenburg, General von Ludendorff, the crown prince and other German leaders. Relations with Russia probably will be the most important subject discussed.

Prince Alexander von Hohenlohe, who has long held liberal views and was among the German representatives at the pacifist congress in Switzerland, expresses the belief that should the Germans as a people rid themselves of the fixed idea that America entered the war only for selfish and material interests, President Wilson's new peace message "can become a way toward peace."

LABORERS CROWDING SEATTLE

WAR INDUSTRIES DRAW LARGE NUMBERS OF MEN — CIVIC BODIES PLAN TO ARRANGE MORE ACCOMMODATIONS

SEATTLE, Jan. 15.—Civic organizations of Seattle are now wrestling with a rapidly growing housing problem. Laborers attracted by high wages paid in shipyards and other war industries here have filled the city. There are a few vacant houses and practically no apartments. Plans now being made to speed up the production of ships, it is stated, will add between 30,000 and 40,000 men to Seattle payrolls in the next few months, and the problem is to provide them and their families with homes. The construction of barracks, patterned after army camps, for the single man has been suggested.

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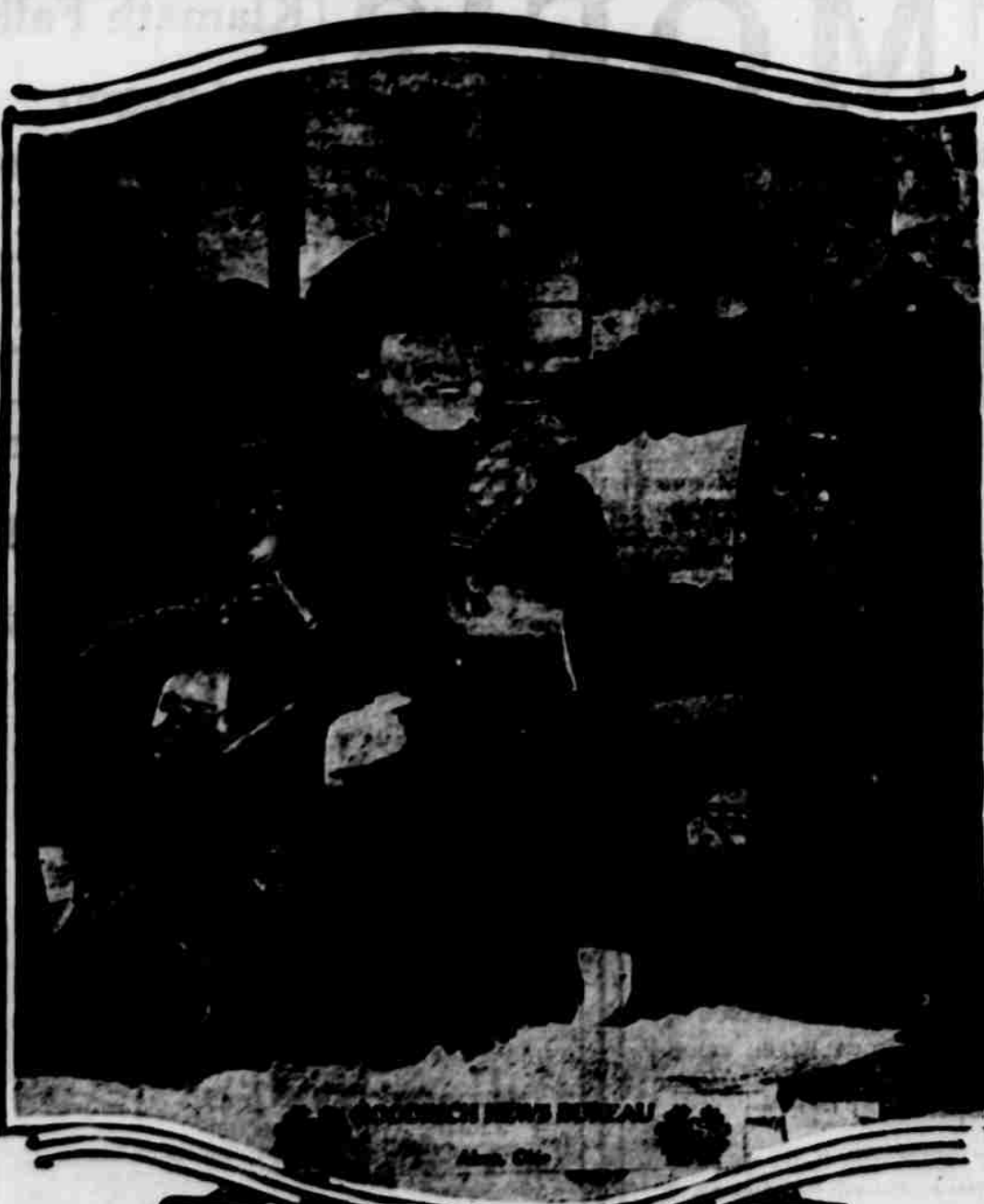
