UNUSUAL JAIL ACCOMMODATIONS

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 15.—Sheriff Seth Orndorf claims the distinction for his new jail that it is the only one which has a roof garden and sun parlor for the prisoners. The new jail is located on the sixth floor of the court house building, and is so arranged that the prisoners may spend the mornings on one side of the court, where they can enjoy the warm, sunny winter days, and on the other side for the afternoon. Only the good conduct prisoners are permitted to enjoy this privilege.

Russ Soldiers Run Wild In Siberia

TOKIO, Jan. 15.—Margaret Foody, New York, the last American woman to leave Petrograd, called for America from a Japanese port a few days ago. She told a news correspondent that it took her two weeks to cross Siberia. She said the train was crowded with deserting Russian soldiers, who took food from passengers, occupied the compartments and used the dining cars for Bolshevik meetings, firing thru the windows.

The temperature most of the time was around 40 degrees below zero. The

soldiers held up the various stations thru which the train passed, subjecting the station masters to violence if they would not do their bidding. Passengers were not allowed to try to obtain food. The train passed Irkutsk half an hour before the Bolsheviks started a reign of terror. During the whole trip passengers obtained water just four times for bathing purposes. "I went thru terrible experiences for six months," said Miss Foody, "but the thrills were worth the hardships."

INCREASE IN SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

ALTHO LESS THAN NORMAL, ON ACCOUNT OF WAR SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS ENCOURAGING INCREASE IN PUPILS

Elementary school enrollment in the United States has been affected by the war, but not to the extent of making it less than that of last year. The following statistics are compiled

from reports of 1,411 cities and 696 counties or districts:

Enrollment, 1916, 6,791,470; 1917, 6,359,262; increase, 167,792.

The normal increase would have been 2 1/2 per cent. The actual increase falls short of this by 1,994, or .03 per cent.

There is an increase in the high school enrollment, but it is only one-fourth of the normal increase. The following figures are based on reports from high schools enrolling 55 per cent of the pupils:

Enrollment, 1916, 874,497; 1917, 863,464; increase, 16,167.

The normal theoretical increase would have been 64,345 (9 1/4 per cent per year). The actual increase is 16,167. The decrease from normal high school enrollment is therefore about 7 per cent.

The increase, altho smaller than usual, is larger than was expected in view of the large number who are in the service of the nation in some capacity.

LIBERAL POLICY FAVORED

BRITISH LABOR PARTY IN MESSAGE TO RUSSIAN PEOPLE OUTLINES LIBERAL PLANS OF GOVERNMENT FOR COLONIES

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The British labor party in a message to the Russian people announced that the British people had accepted the Russian principle of self determination of the people with no annexations for the British empire, particularly in Middle East Africa and India.

The message declared that a policy was favored for placing all tropical Africa under a uniform international control, and promised the self government of India and a protectorate for Asia Minor by international organization.

BOLSHEVIKI IS GROWING DISCOURAGED

MANY NOW BELIEVE THAT THERE IS LITTLE CHANCE OF SATISFACTORY PEACE TERMS WITH GERMANY
