Move Begun To Aid Food Administration

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 17.—A movement to organize the forces of the insurance departments of Oregon, Washington and Idaho to assist the federal food administration and the state councils of defense in their work on conservation has been started. It was announced recently that steps had already been taken to use the organization and co-operation between the commissioners of these three states having supervision of the work.

State Proclamation For "Father And Son Week"

SALEM, Jan. 17.—Governor Withycombe issued today a message urging the people of Oregon to observe "Father and Son Week," between February 11 and 17, the dates set aside for a national movement of this nature by the interstate committee of the Y. M. C. A.

Oregon's governor, who himself has a son in active military service, points out that the 30,000 young Oregon soldiers who have already gone forward are entitled to constant thought and prayer, and that their younger brothers at home "deserve the fullest possible measure of parental encouragement and counsel."

The governor's message, which, it is understood, will be followed by messages from the mayors of the

various cities and towns in Oregon, follows:

"Mindful that there is now greater occasion than ever before to cement the bond of fellowship between fathers and sons, the Y. M. C. A. officials have set aside the period of February 11 to 17 to be observed as 'Father and Son Week,' and I am indeed glad to commend the idea to the hearty support of the patriotic people of Oregon.

"Oregon has thus far furnished 30,000 of the flower of its young manhood to the service of our country in the world's great cataclysm. Just as these noble boys who have already shouldered solemn responsibilities for this nation and for the world are entitled to our constant thought and prayer, so their younger brothers at
