The United States civil service commission announces an open competitive examination for the following positions, for men only: Sawyer, saw filer, grader, blacksmith, machinist, stationary engineer and other. A number of vacancies in the spruce production division signal corps, war department, for duty at Vancouver barracks, Washington, at standard wages paid for any of these positions, will be filled from this examination. Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated on the following subjects, which will have relative weights, indicated on the scale of 100. 1—Physical ability, 40. 2—Experience, 60. Applicants must show that they have had at least one year's actual experience. Until further notice on account of the urgent needs of the service, applications will be accepted at any time, papers promptly rated, and certification will be made as the needs of the service require. The First Photo of American Wounded Officer



This is declared by the British official war picture office to be the first photograph of a wounded American soldier to be sent to the United States. He is Lieutenant Welsey, who was in the fight at Cambrai. He was struck by a "whizz bang." After the battle he was shipped to London, and, of course, as the first wounded American to reach a London hospital, he attracted much attention.
