MANY GAME FISH ARE HATCHED

TOTAL OF OVER 10,000,000 GAME FISH HATCHED IN STATE DURING YEAR PASSED, ACCORDING TO REPORT JUST MADE

SALEM, Jan. 19.—The output of various Oregon hatcheries in trout and game fish during the past year totalled more than 10,000,000, according to figures made public by Master Fish Warden Stanton in his report to Governor Withycombe for December.

"Notwithstanding the fact that we were handicapped by a shortage of experienced help, the number of fish of these species liberated is the greatest since this branch of the work was taken up, and not only is the output greater in number, but the fry average is larger in size as well as being in finer condition when placed in the various streams throughout the state," the report declares.

Referring to Chinook salmon, the report declares that the eggs have hatched with practically no loss, and that the Bonneville hatchery has on hand "the best and most thrifty lot of young salmon" it has ever had. The 3,000,000 sockeye salmon resulting from eggs received from the federal bureau of fisheries also are said to be doing well.

Big Stock Show Begins In Denver

DENVER, Jan. 19.—The Twelfth annual National Western Stock Show and Horse Fair will open in the amphitheatre at the Denver stock yards tomorrow, and will continue until midnight, January 26th. The exposition will be the only Western rodeo held under special government sanction, and therefore exempt from war tax on the tickets of admission under a special ruling by Commissioner Roper of the department of the interior.

Soldiers Rapidly Made At State University

EUGENE, Jan. 19.—Uniforms for all men in the University of Oregon have arrived, and are on sale at the co-operative store. Khaki overalls and leggings make up the uniform. Guns also have been received and issued. Governor Withycombe is expected to come to Eugene to review the battalion January 23, and within two weeks a reviewing officer from American Lake will review the men. An officer from San Francisco will repeat the process a week later. A model trench has been completed on the old golf course. Bomb exercises have been taken up. Colonel Leader has invited all students who have ideas in camouflaging to see him, and he will give them a chance to practice the art. He believes Americans should be superior to the English and French in this branch of war activities.

Feeling in Norway Is Bitter Against U.S.

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 19.—Feeling in Norway against America and to a less degree against the other entente allies is growing bitter. It is reported here that America demands the stoppage of Norwegian exports to Germany in return for shipments of grain to Norway, but refuses to guarantee or promise Norway any supplies. The Norwegians are asking why they should offend Germany by curtailing supplies at the behest of America, and also risk being left empty-handed by America after all. Reports that Denmark is receiving provisions and other goods from America are received with amazement and some anger. The Norwegians say it is an open secret that the Danes have fed Germany during the whole period of the war, while the Norwegians claim to be comparatively innocent. Yet, they say, Denmark is

The principles upon which I stand and to which I pledge myself are: 1.—To support the national administration and the heads of the government with all my ability and energy in the speedy and vigorous prosecution of the war to a peace satisfactory to the democracy of the world and compatible with the highest ideals of our civilization. 2.—To the application of the selective draft in practice as well as theory, which shall insure organization of the national army and at the same time reserve the necessary labor and supplies for the continuation of our industrial pursuits and commerce. 3.—To an equitable control and regulation of food supplies, commerce and industry, and the establishment of a primary market in Portland on equal basis with Chicago and Eastern ports. 4.—To a nation-wide prohibition and to all measures which shall make it practicable and operative and not theoretical. 5.—To permanently establish equal suffrage in both state and nation. 6.—To establishment by the federal government of a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia River. 7.—To effective rural credit legislation and administration with a particular view to its adaptability to the needs of Oregon. 8.—To construction by the federal government of a military highway along the Pacific Coast, and federal aid in the construction of permanent highways. 9.—To see that Oregon participates in all things being equal, in national trade, commerce and industry, and that our state is given recognition in the federal expenditures made necessary by the war. 10.—To legislation which shall bring to a settlement the public lands question, and the greater development of Oregon's natural resources, including the development of water power, reclamation of arid, swamp and logged off lands. 11.—To the organization and mobilization of all our industrial forces, with a just and proper consideration of the rights of labor, which shall guarantee co-ordination of American efforts during the war. 12.—To legislation that will permit the natural resources of the great West and Alaska to be used, at the same time being careful that these natural resources are used economically. 13.—To the removal of the misunderstanding and opposition on the part of the federal authorities which has restricted Oregon's commercial expansion and retarded her industrial development. 14.—To the development of Oregon's great shipping ports, thru federal improvement of waterways and harbors; the maintenance of a merchant marine on the Pacific Ocean, and a just recognition on the part of the federal government of the importance, value, commercial and industrial advantage of Oregon's location, situation and harbor and shipping facilities. 15.—To a policy of conservation and reconstruction which shall insure our national integrity, honor and commerce, and the moral and civic purity of our people. 16.—To have that high regard and consideration for the interests and progress of humanity and the action at large, which is typified by a conscientious and moral observance of true Christian civilization.
