BIG CIGAR STRIKE ENDED

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Jan. 19.—Fifteen thousand cigar makers and tobacco workers have returned to work in the tobacco factories of the Porto Rican American Tobacco company, after their representatives signed an agreement with the officers of the company.

This ends the longest and most general cigar strike the island has ever had. The wage increase provided for the payment of \$2.50 per thousand cigars, while the strikers were granted an increase of approximately 50 per cent. The increased wage will amount to more than \$100,000 per year, it is estimated. The strike had been practically continued since the middle of last September, and caused a loss estimated at \$5,000,000.
