Income Tax Man Leaves Next Week

A large group of Klamath residents have availed themselves of the opportunity to visit the income tax inspector during his stay in this city, the lowest number of visits in any one day being seventeen.

Inspector Hogg announces that he expects to leave for Lakeview next Wednesday, and it is therefore important that those who wish to interview him make arrangements to do so at once.

The following general notes will be of interest in this connection: Income of minors must be included in the income of the parents.

Heads of families must make returns if their income is as much as \$2,000, regardless of the extra exemption for dependent children.

Income of husband and wife must be included in one return unless each makes a separate return.

Information has come to Inspector

Hogg that there is an impression in some quarters that the government must find the people who have the taxable incomes. The law requires the individual to look up the government and make his own return. The inspector is here, not to hunt for those who have taxable incomes, but merely to assist and explain the law to those who desire his services.

After March 1st the internal revenue department will take the necessary steps to find those who neglect to make their returns within the time prescribed by law.

Such individuals will be subject to an additional tax and a heavy fine. Inspector Hogg will be glad to meet the taxpayers at any time, day or evening, to suit the convenience of the public. Please telephone if an appointment is desired outside of ordinary business hours. 211 Willis building.
