

Basketball Proves Popular in Army

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22.—Basketball has become one of the favorite sports of the soldiers in the military cantonments of the Pacific Coast. No less than eighteen teams already have been organized at the Presidio reservation, which are practicing regularly, and the prospects are still that more teams shall be formed.

Plans now are being made to get up some sort of program of play which will lead up to a basketball championship. It has been suggested

that each camp draw up a schedule in order to determine the best team. The best team in each camp will then meet in an elimination schedule for the championship.

Much Interest In Big Mining Meeting

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 22.—Far more than state wide interest is attached to the fifth annual convention of the Colorado Metal Mining Association and the Colorado Chapter of the American Mining Congress, which met in joint convention at the state capitol today. The all-important question on silver will be discussed in all its various ramifications, the question of government control of metal mines and their products, and the puzzling application of the excess profits tax are foremost of topics to be discussed.

Metal mining and oil men of the entire West are here in order that the entire industry can unite upon

some line of action in regard to the federal legislation, possible government control and take steps to safeguard their interests after the war as well as during the present uncertain times.

Today's session is expected to be one of the most vital of all the three days' meetings with an address on the silver question by Emmet D. Boye, governor of Nevada, who has taken a leading part in uniting the silver producers of the West in an effort to present their side of the question of the government control to the officials at Washington. The remainder of the session is to be taken up with election of officers and routine business.

Nevada and Arizona. All were men experienced in the work of previous campaigns and all had valuable suggestions for the improvement of methods for the next Liberty Loan campaign.

No definite date has been officially set for the third Liberty Loan campaign, but it is predicted by bankers and bond dealers that the issue will not be announced for an earlier date than March 15th.

Oregon's subscription to the second Liberty Loan totaled \$35,455.50. Local bankers are advised that it will be necessary to raise \$5,000,000 more in bond issues between now and July 1st. Based on previous subscriptions in Oregon, this state's allotment of such an issue would be \$40,000,000.

The committee for handling future Liberty Loans in Oregon, of which Edward Cookingham is chairman, are outlining a plan of campaign which will be announced in the near future.

MANY APPEALS MADE FOR HIGHER WAGES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—Secretary of the Interior Lane, head of the newly appointed railway wage board, already is flooded with letters and appeals for wage adjustment. He has announced that he had called the meetings of the board for each afternoon this week, until a general procedure had been adopted.

It is generally accepted here that wage increases will come, inasmuch as it has been admitted that the increased cost of living has seriously affected the railroad men of the country.

British Labor Party Out After Capitalists

LONDON, Jan. 22.—Demands for the calling of an immediate or early conference of representatives of labor

from all countries to discuss peace will be among the most important of the resolutions to be submitted to the conference of the British labor party to be held at Nottingham tomorrow and on the two days following. Three resolutions, requesting such action have been prepared for submission to the conference by the independent labor party, the socialist party and the Glasgow trades council.

Various phases of the peace question apparently will be dominant in the discussions. Declaration that the time has arrived for peace negotiation is made in four resolutions to be submitted by the labor organizations of Bristol, Norwich, Leicester and York.

A demand that labor be permitted representation in the eventual peace congress of the belligerent powers, or that an international labor conference be held simultaneously with the peace congress, is set forth by labor

bodies of Great Yarmouth and Bristol.

Withdrawal of all labor members from ministerial offices under the present government is demanded in eight resolutions prepared by the British socialist party or by labor bodies, on the ground that continuance of labor members in the service of a government which "permits exploitation of the people by the capitalists" is contrary to labor interests and a violation of the party constitution.

One such resolution from Eastham bases its demands on "the continual bare-faced robbery of the people by the food pirates," and suggests that any laborer who refuses to resign should be expelled from the party. "Capitalist food thieves" are strongly denounced, and the government is urged to handle the food problem so as to eliminate profiteering and secure "equality of sacrifice." There is likely to be a long and bitter discussion on this issue. A year ago the conference reaffirmed by an overwhelming majority, approval of the retention of office by labor ministers.

Next Liberty Loan About March 15th

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank, and Edward Cookingham, vice president of the Ladd & Tilton bank, have returned from San Francisco where they have been attending a meeting of delegates from the seven states in the Twelfth Federal reserve district, preparing campaign methods for the third Liberty Loan drive.

"While no definite program for the next Liberty Loan campaign was arranged at the two days' meeting in

San Francisco, it is certain that our organization will be much more complete than in the second Liberty Loan drive," said Mr. Cookingham. "In Oregon more intensive methods must be applied, especially in country districts. Committees and sub committees for handling the work have not been named, but the state will be thoroughly covered and every dollar set working for the government."
