CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZES CONSTRUCTION ON SEVERAL NEW BUILDINGS—COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE PAVING PLANT

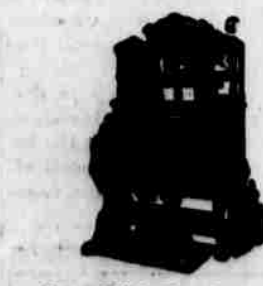

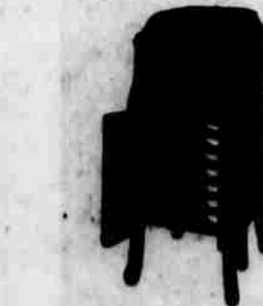

ESTIMATES ON COURT
HOUSE ARE NOW PUBLIC

cernable in the walls of the building are caused by uneven settlement, and to avoid such a condition in a building of this type on unfamiliar ground, borings should have been made to ascertain if the hard pan near the surface continued for any substantial depth. It is not known whether such tests were made before the building was begun. He looks for some further settlement on the interior footings under the columns, which have not been as yet heavily loaded, and believes that unsightly conditions would result unless the foundation faults were corrected. This remedy, he says, "while feasible, would involve careful workmanship, and would entail an uncertain expense, depending on the amount of new footings required."

John George Kelley Jr. of the Pitt-

tick building, Portland, declares that at the present time the building is in very bad shape, cracks having developed under the floor beams and trusses in the bearing walls. These cracks, he says, are of a very serious nature, as they indicate fundamental weakness in the general construction. He believes it would be dangerous to further load on any of the beams.

After naming several other faulty examples of inferior construction, he sums up the matter by stating that the building could not be completed without a very expensive investment, which would be of a makeshift nature, and would be certain to be unsatisfactory. He therefore recommends that the building be abandoned, as it would cost over \$240,000 to alter it and complete under the present plans and specifications. He estimates that a satisfactory structure could be completed at a smaller cost on some other site. His total estimate for completing the house and grounds is \$283,333.

An architect, probably one of the three whose bids have been received, will be retained by the County Court, which will go into the details of the cost on the partially completed building at greater length before making final decision, according to County Judge Marion Hanks.

The three reports issued will be run verbatim in the Herald, one each day, during the next three days.

YARDMASTER INJURED

DEATHS REPORTED
