Great Food Saving Is Necessary Here

California Food Chief After Talk With Hoover, Says We Must Maintain Present Rate of Export If We Hope to Win War. Wheat and Pork Big Items

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22.—"If we do not maintain our present food exports we are going to lose this war."

This statement was made by Ralph P. Merritt, federal food administrator for California, after his return from Washington, where he conferred with Herbert C. Hoover.

Mr. Merritt said the situation was hopeful both for increased production and a consequent increase of exports. "The wheat acreage of the country has been increased about 20 per cent for fall and spring planting," Mr. Merritt stated. "In California this acreage has increased from approximately 350,000 to more than 450,000 acres. There is every indication of a record yield.

"However, between now and next September we will be obliged to export approximately 90,000,000 bushels or 30 per cent of our national crop for the use of our armies and the allies.

"Wheat and pork are the two big items we must conserve. If we are permitted to follow out our program thru general conservation. "The food administration is endeavoring to create a definite surplus in all commodities affected. All over this surplus will be disposed of by the removal of restrictions. Thus we are discontinuing meatless days for a time in some of the Western states because this surplus has been exceeded in the principal meats affected, outside of pork.

"The creation of compulsory meatless, heatless and other 'less' days will be determined by the final disposition of a joint measure now in session which will give the president and the food administration the right to draw up a food conservation program and enforce its observance.

"The country is asked to do two things: Cut down its wheat consumption and substitute perishables for the things we export. If we hold to this program there will never be any necessity of rationing the country."

The Washington conference concerned itself with a wheat program almost exclusively, Mr. Merritt said. This program was placed in the hands of seven food administrators, Mr. Merritt being a member of the committee.

People Urged to Store Natural Ice

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—Farmers and others who harvest natural ice this winter and store it for summer use will aid greatly in the conservation of ammonia, vitally important at this time, it is pointed out by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Ammonia is a necessity in the manufacture of ice. Every ton of natural ice harvested means a certain amount of ammonia saved. Ammonia salts are regarded as an essential in the manufacture of certain fertilizers. The most important chemicals used in making ammonium nitrate and other explosives are readily made from ammonia and every quart of America's already small supply that can be saved means more power to America's armies.

Thus the farmer is interested in the conservation of ammonia not only from a national standpoint, but because of his personal interests. Ammonia saved thru harvesting of natural ice means more ammonia for fertilizers and more ammonia for ammunition. The man who harvests ice

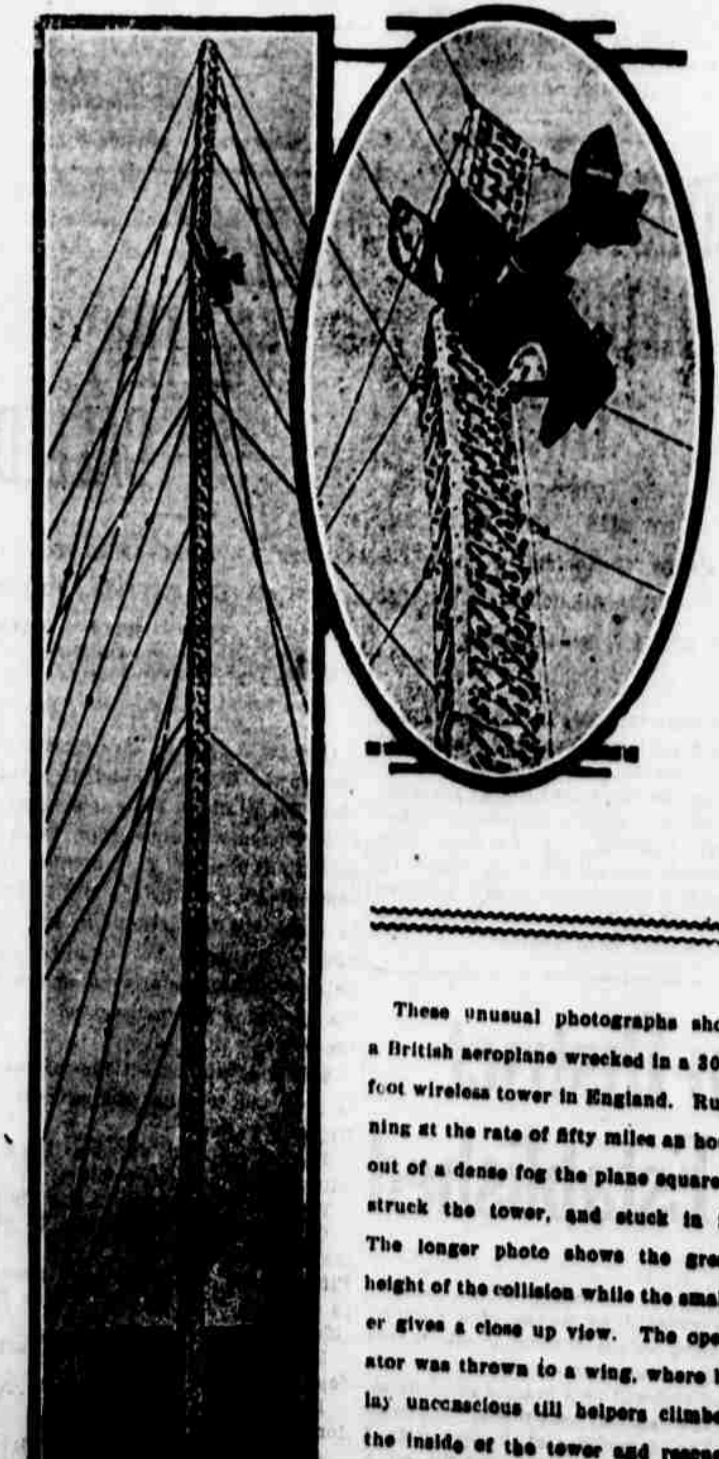
