Rice Polish As Food
Is Now Recommended

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—Rice polish, heretofore used for feeding stock, is now being employed as a valuable wheat substitute. Its new utilization has been introduced by Miss Rosa K. Armstrong, special agent of the states relations service of the United States Department of Agriculture. Miss Armstrong was sent to New Orleans, La., to teach women to make war breads. While there she discovered that the waste which comes from the rice in its polishing process was being sold by the ton as a sack food. It is said that this product contains the most nutritive portion of the rice, and Miss Armstrong has had it placed on the market, where, sold for 3½ and 3 cents a pound, it is now being used extensively and successfully in a proportion of one-fourth rice polish to one-fourth wheat flour.

The placing of brown rice on the market as a cheap and wholesome addition to the Louisiana diet is also to the credit of Miss Armstrong. Brown rice is rice with the first hull upon it, and that hull is rich in mineral content.

INDIAN TRIAL
NEARLY DONE

ARGUMENTS IN COPPERFIELD CASE COMMENCED THIS MORNING—CASE BE IN JURY HANDS BEFORE NIGHT

The testimony in the Copperfield case now in the Circuit Court of Judge D. V. Kuykendall was completed on both sides at the close of the afternoon session yesterday, and the arguments were commenced at 10 o'clock this morning. A large number of witnesses have been examined during the last two days. It now seems probable that the case will be in the hands of the jury before night.

It was brought out in the testimony that Miss Lucile Stewart was proceeding out Sixth street early in the evening of November 10th. The defendant, Earl Copperfield, was coming in the opposite direction. He turned out to pass an auto, and was too close to Miss Stewart's rig to avoid mishap when he first saw her. He declares that he saw it was too late to turn to the right again without smashing directly into the buggy, and he therefore tried to pass by on the left, and ran into the horse, which was badly injured, and had to be shot.

Miss Stewart was stunned by the collision and could not swear who had collided with her. Much of the testimony introduced was relative as to whether or not Copperfield was intoxicated.
