

ENEMY FORCED TO YIELD TERRITORY

ACTIVITIES ON BATTLE LINES ARE FAVORABLE

AMERICANS ARE NOW BELIEVED IN TRENCHES

INDICATIONS ARE TAKEN FROM LIST OF CASUALTIES TURNED IN BY GENERAL PERSHING—INFORMATION REFUSED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—The interpretation generally placed on the casualty list submitted by General Pershing is that the American battalions have been returned to the front line trenches after an absence of two weeks.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—The French forces executed a brilliant raid on Monday near Four de Paris by penetrating the enemy's lines to a depth of over a quarter of a mile along a front of nearly two miles.

MANY PRISONERS WERE TAKEN AND THE DEFENSES WERE DESTROYED, AFTER WHICH THE FRENCH FORCES RETURNED SAFELY TO THEIR OWN LINES.

ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS, Jan. 24.—The enemy has evacuated a large territory on the northern mountain front behind Monte Tomba and from the Piave River westward their defense line has been moved back to Monte Spincola.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 24.—Forty were killed and 200 wounded in Moscow riots during a demonstration at the anniversary celebration of "Bloody Sunday."

FLOUR SALES MAY SOON BE CURTAILED

Oregon Is Making Proud Army Record

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—The name of Oregon stands out proudly on a colonial report which will go down in history as one of the great documents of the war. It is the report of the provost marshal general to the secretary of war on the operations of the first draft under the selective military service act of 1917.

"Oregon first" is the outstanding feature of the report, studying it from every angle of its mass of detail. In the ratio of actual enlistments to gross quota by degrees, Oregon is shown to head the list by a big margin. Her score is 157 degrees. The nearest approach to this is Utah, with 114 degrees. INCOME TAX INSPECTOR BUSY MAN
