SUPER GRAIN MAY SOON BE ANNOUNCED

CALIFORNIA WIZARD AT SANTA ROSA EXPECTED TO DEVELOP A GRAIN THAT WILL BE USEFUL AS HIS SUPER WHEAT

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—Luther Burbank, plant wizard, who some time ago developed a "super-wheat," which has proved valuable to the government's war purposes, is reported here to have been working fourteen hours a day on another "super" grain which may prove of even greater value to the United States and its allies.
Burbank, who is 65 years old, has been hard at work in his garden laboratory in Santa Rosa for several months. Just what the nature of the new discovery will be was not known, but it was said that an important announcement might be expected soon.

Brutal Murder of Russ General Is Described

Infuriated Mob of Bolsheviki Surrounds Train Containing Officer, Stab Him to Death and Tear Clothing From His Body. Mud Ball Then Thrown at Corpse

PARIS, Jan. 24.—A vivid picture of the circumstances of the murder of the infuriated bolsheviki, of General Dukhonin, formerly commander-in-chief of the Russian army, is given by the Petrograd correspondent of the Matin, who apparently was an eyewitness of the tragedy. According to his story, Ensign Krylenko, the bolsheviki commander in chief, endeavored to save General Dukhonin from the mob, but his efforts were unavailing and the Russian commander was struck down by a sailor, and then run thru with a dozen bayonets.
The murder took place after the bolsheviki had captured the headquarters of the Russian army at Makhov, and followed General Dukhonin's refusal to request the German army officials to enter into an armistice with the bolsheviki. The general was on board a train when the mob surrounded him. According to the Matin's correspondent the general appeared at the window of his railway carriage.
"Throw us your epaulettes!" shrieked the soldiers, "or we will kill you," and they shouldered their rifles.
Krylenko begged the general to give way to them.
"They can go to the deuce," he cried. "Let them kill me!"
A bullet whistled by, breaking the window, then a second. General Dukhonin went up to Dukhonin and gently took off his epaulettes. They were thrown to the mob and were quickly torn to pieces, and for a moment he

Texas Cowpunchers Rushing to Enlist

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 24.—High-heeled cowboy boots, chaps and "ten gallon" hats have replaced shoes of velvet, but it is known that the British caps as the wearing apparel of the majority of recruits who are accepted at the local army recruiting station for service in the American liberty army.
The rush of the city boys and young men to join the colors is almost over, according to the officer in charge of the station. But the news that the United States needed her young men has just begun to percolate to the isolated cow camps, ranches and mining districts of the Southwest. The result was a rush of applicants for enlistment from these sparsely settled districts of the Southwest.
When given their choice of the branches in which they may serve, the men invariably ask for assignment to the cavalry division, as they shoot from the saddle, and never walk when they can ride. But when they are told the cavalry will not be sent abroad as soon as the other branches they almost always change their requests and ask for assignment in the engineers, artillery or even in the infantry, altho the typical cowboy never walks when he can ride.
Because of their life out doors, their regular habits and their acquaintance with the simple fare of the chuck wagons, these men are quickly transcribed into good soldiers, the recruiting officers say.

Coast to Coast Air Line for Mail Service

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 24.—Airplanes will replace trains and automobiles in carrying the United States mail within a few years, according to a prediction made by Frederick Porter, chairman of the membership committee of the Pacific Aero club, who is here from San Francisco to look into the matter of selecting a landing site for United States mail flyers.
Sacramento is on the airline known as the Woodrow Wilson Aerial Highway, crossing the United States from New York to San Francisco, proposed in the authorization by the postmaster general for 200 or more air routes to be established by the department after the war. Since this fact became known the Pacific Aero club became interested in the scheme to replace the train mail service by airplane service and the visit to Sacramento by Mr. Porter is the result.

Coast Wheat Problems Discussed at Spokane

SPOKANE, Jan. 24.—Grain growers and dealers from several states are expected to attend a wheat handling conference to be held here January 25th and 26th, when plans for expediting the movement of the 1918 grain crop of the Pacific Northwest will be discussed.
Most of the crop will be handled in bulk, grain men assert, on account of the scarcity and high prices of sacks. As a certain number of sacks are necessary to handle the crop, the delegates will endeavor to obtain authoritative information as to the available supply and the cost.
M. H. Houser of Portland, representative of the grain division of the federal food administration, will deliver one of the principal talks. His topic will be "Price and Destination. Whether Surplus Will Go East by Rail or West Thru the Canal." L. M. Jeffers of the United States Department of Grain Supervision of Portland is another man scheduled to speak.

Bolsheviki and Soldiers Who Overturned the Russian Government During Its Recent Session
