Mail Boxes Must Now Be Installed

Postmaster Emphasizes the Immediate Necessity of Getting Boxes Up Along the New Route Thru Mills Addition and Spring Lake District

Patrons of the proposed rural route must erect their boxes at once—only a few days left now before the final inspection will be made, and the failure of a few patrons to provide the approved form of mail box may cause the cancellation of the whole route by the department. Uncle Sam has done his part—he has granted the establishment of the route, provided you do yours—you must erect the regular box, and do it at once—put it up today.

This especially applies to residents of Mills Addition who have long been wanting mail service. You have your opportunity now, as every resident of Mills Addition can have service on this route if he will place his box on the line of travel as described before,

and which is here again given for your guidance.

While the service will at first be but three times a week, if it is well patronized it will be but a short time until it can be made a daily route—this also depends upon you. Urge every resident to patronize the route. Two families may use the same box provided their agreement in writing to that effect is filed in this office.

The route thru Mills Addition is as follows: Entering Mills Addition on the road past Big Basin Lumber company, south on Main street, to White, east to Martin, north to Applegate, east to Mitchell, south to white, east to Washburn and thence south to intersection with main road.

The regular approved mail box is the only one the government will accept. They can be purchased from the hardware dealers here.
