APPOINTED

NEW YORK MAN NAMED SURVEYOR GENERAL OF ALL ARMY SUPPLIES—WAR DEPARTMENT SUPPLIES UNDER ONE MAN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 26.—Edward Stettinius of New York has been appointed surveyor general of all the army supplies. The new post, which is really in effect a munitions supervisor, consolidates all the war department supply question under one man. This is regarded as the administration's reply to the munitions ministry bill.

JOB IN ARMY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 26.—Discontinuance of the extra pay allowance for men in the aviation service is under consideration at the war department. The extra pay was provided on the theory that aviation was the most hazardous branch of the service, but casualty figures of the allied armies show that flying is safer than the infantry and other arms. Under present regulations, a first lieutenant in aviation who secures a rating as military aviator is immediately awarded for purposes of pay computation, promotion to a captaincy, which carries a salary of about \$4,000 a year. A detail to duty requiring regular flights adds 50 per cent to this sum, and another 20 per cent is added for foreign service, increasing the lieutenant's pay to more than \$4,000 a year.

Picking Coal on New York Dumps



From the many municipal buildings in New York City some hundreds of tons of ashes are dumped every day on the site to be occupied by a new and costly county court house. Each morning hundreds of men, women and children from the nearby tenements scrape over the ashes to pick the lumps of coal that have slipped thru the furnace grates. Tons of coal are thus carried off each day to warm tenement dwellers who might otherwise suffer.

U. S. Airmen Prove
To Be Hardy Lot

AMERICAN AVIATION TRAINING CAMP, Southern Italy, Jan. 26—"You can't kill an American," is the dictum of the Italian officers training the several hundred young aviators who have been flying here since the end of September, when, by arrangement with the Italian government, this camp was established.

The Americans have such a reputation for luck that Italian soldiers come here so they may touch one of the aviators. "It brings us good luck, too," they explain.

The Americans fly from morning until night virtually every day. Not a single one has been killed, and but three have been injured at all seriously. One of the latter, on his third trip alone, got into an air situation which he did not understand, with the result that he stopped his motor, whereupon the machine began to plunge downwards until its fall was checked by the telegraph wires of the railway station of the nearby city. Thence the machine dropped to the ground, and was smashed. The aviator was picked up for dead, but in

five days he was ready for another fly. The prize story of the camp concerns Harry Harris of California, who got lost, first in the clouds and then in central Italy. He was a couple of hours going away, and a whole week coming back to camp. As he afterwards explained, he went up for an altitude, and when he got above the clouds he was unable to discover whether he was flying upside down or right side up, or whether the earth was above him or below him.

PORTLAND
SIDES WITH
SENATORPEOPLE IN NORTHERN OREGON
REPORTED TO BE CONVINCED
THAT CHAMBERLAIN IS RIGHT
IN CONTROVERSY AT CAPITAL

PORTLAND, Jan. 25.—Sentiment in Oregon is behind Senator George E. Chamberlain in his tilt with President Wilson on the inefficiency of the war department; this is the situation in the state, if expressions recorded in Portland are a sure guide.

Revelations brought to light by congressional investigation have convinced Oregon people that Chamberlain is pursuing the proper and patriotic course. Around Portland exists a belief that President Wilson spoke hastily, and without weighing his words, and that the president overlooked the fact that in the administration war program the Oregon senator was the one man who put the program thru congress.

In Oregon the patriotic people are wondering what Secretary of War Baker has done in comparison with what Senator Chamberlain has accomplished to strengthen the hands of the president and help America win the war. And between Baker and Chamberlain the plain Oregon folk can't understand why the president should sacrifice the latter to protect the former.

Northwest Lumbermen
Charge Discrimination

PORTLAND, Jan. 26—Lumber producers and logging operators have been given what they call a solar plexus shock on learning that President Wilson intends to issue a proclamation fixing an eight-hour work day in logging camps and sawmills throughout the Pacific Northwest, without applying the same regulation to producers in the Southern states, or even in California. Issuance of the executive proclamation is reported to have been determined upon at the conclusion of conferences between the department of labor, the federal shipping board and other government agencies as a means of "preserving harmony in the lumber industry" and to expedite production of fir for ships and spruce for airplanes.

Among several representative lumber producers in Portland the inference was clear that the president had concurred in the report and recommendations of Secretary of Labor Wilson in favoring a regional eight-hour work day for all employees in

lumber production in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, following conferences with producers at Spokane and Seattle early in December. At these meetings it was made plain by the producers to the federal labor representatives that they had no hesitancy in placing their industries on a basic eight-hour day if the requirement was made country wide in its scope, but they refused to be convinced that it would be fair to apply the eight hour rule to the Pacific Northwest while giving producers of pine lumber in the Southern states an advantage by permitting their employees to labor on a ten and eleven hour shifts at rates of pay far below those paid in Oregon, Washington and the two mountain states to the east.

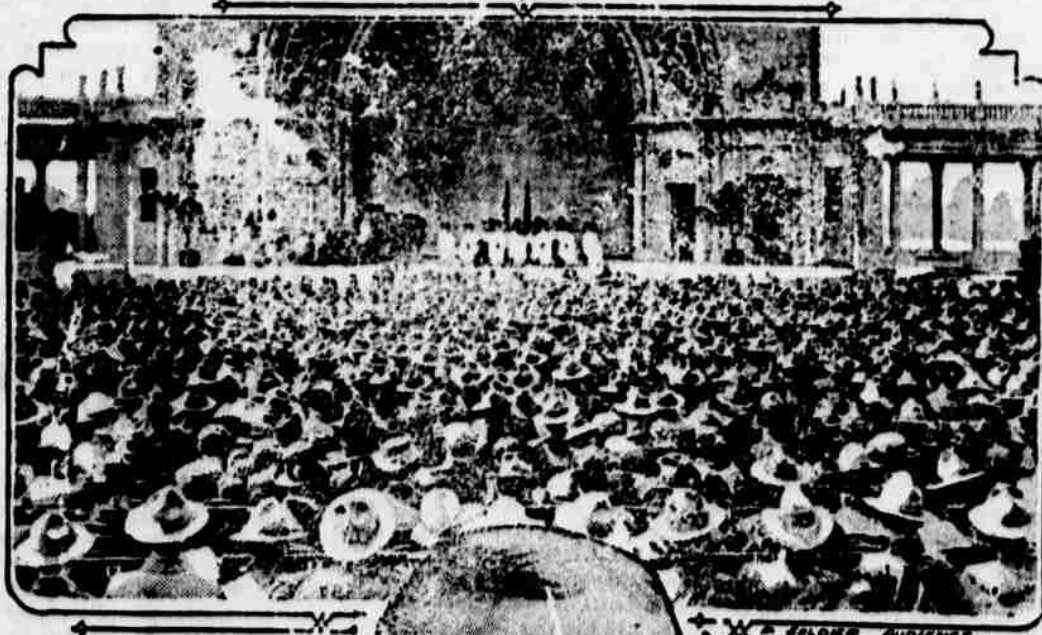

Sells Smileage for the Soldiers



In order that the expense of the entertainments which, at the direction of the Secretary of War, are being given the soldiers of Uncle Sam, under the management of the Military Entertainment Council, may be taken care of, this council has issued "Smileage Books". These books are sold for \$1 and \$5, according to whether they contain 20 or 100 coupons, and will entitle soldiers to free admission to any entertainment in any National Guard or National Cantonment in the United States. Friends of the soldiers may purchase and send these passes to soldiers by name or to the camps for distribution.

separate auspices, has all been consolidated under one official body, the Military Entertainment Council, appointed by the Secretary of War. This Council is a part of the Commission on Training Camp Activities, of which Raymond B. Fosdick is chairman. Credit for the plan of consolidation is given Harry P. Harrison, of Chicago, executive chairman of the Smileage Campaign.

The consolidation of the various forms of entertainment is, perhaps, the first thing of its kind in the country. It is the first time the Government has undertaken to put on real stunts for its soldiers. Under the new arrangement all entertainment in the camps is to be turned over to the Military Entertainment Council, the Chautauqua and the theaters as "Liberty Theaters."

Everybody is expected to buy at least one "Smileage Book."
