CITIZENS MEETING TO BE HELD AT CITY HALL AT WHICH ADVISABILITY OF MUNICIPAL PLANT WILL BE DISCUSSED

It is earnestly desired that as many of the business men and tax payers of the city as possible, be present this evening at the meeting in the city hall, where the question of the practicability of installing a municipal paving plant and going ahead with an extensive street improvement program this coming year will be discussed in detail.

Councilmen W. T. Lee and I. R. Struble, who were recently appointed by the council to look into this matter, have spent considerable time in their examination, and are prepared to make public their opinions. It is pointed out that if such a plan is to be adopted, it should be done at an early date, before the season is too far advanced.

BOLSHIEVSKI SIDES

RUMANIAN TREASURY

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 26.—According to a Petrograd dispatch to German newspapers, which was received by an indirect route, the bolshieviki has seized a portion of the funds of the Rumanian treasury deposited in Moscow, and also taken the Rumanian crown jewels at Kishinev.

According to the dispatch, Queen Mary of Rumania has fled from Kishinev to Jassy, the Rumanian capital.

Army Captain Who Robbed Bank and Shot Himself

The case of Captain Lewis R. Whisler, who robbed the army bank at Camp Funston, Kans., of \$62,000 and killed four men with a hatchet, is one of the strangest known. He got off with the money, and hid it in his quarters. When he learned one of his victims had survived and might identify him he shot himself to death.

Prominent Siskiyou Man Faces A Serious Charge

ASHLAND, Jan. 26.—George Hellmuth, a native of Siskiyou county, former chairman of the board of supervisors, manager of the largest mercantile stores in the county and former railroad conductor on the Shasta division, was indicted by the United States grand jury in Sacramento, charged with conspiracy to defeat the select draft law. Archie Crawford, manager of Hellmuth's store at Montague, and his wife, Mrs. Bernice Crawford, are also included in the indictment. The warrants were served on the parties named by Deputy U. S. Marshal I. W. Grover.

Hellmuth is general manager of the Denby-Bar Mercantile company, which operates stores at Fort Jones, Callahan, Etna Mills, Montague and Gaselle. Crawford, who is manager of Hellmuth's store at Montague, which is known as the Denby-Bar Mercantile company, is within the draft age. He is charged with having conspired with Hellmuth to secure his exemption on a dependency charge. Mrs. Crawford is charged with having falsely sworn to exemption of her husband. Hellmuth, who is of German descent, according to the federal officers, has been carrying on a German propaganda in Siskiyou county. He is charged with trying to block the Liberty loan and conspiring to defeat the draft.

Denman Is Strong For Wooden Ships

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 26.—German submarines will cost the allies 6,000,000 tons of merchant shipping during the present year, William Denman, former chairman of the shipping board, predicted to the senate commerce committee.

Damage done to vessels, loss of efficiency due to military conditions and normal wear and tear, will reduce the

efficiency of the allied shipping approximately 60 per cent, Denman added. In the face of these conditions, he declared that "we cannot afford to miss the opportunity to build a single wooden vessel." He declared that while wooden ships are less efficient and more expensive than steel, the demand for tonnage is so great that every wooden ship possible should be constructed.
