Uncle Sam Now Canning Seal Meat

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 28.—A complete cannery for the packing of seal meat was landed at Pribiloff Island seal rookeries by the United States Fisheries bureau steamer Roosevelt, which has returned here from its winter trip to the north. The government will can for export all seal meat not required for the population of the islands.

H. J. Christoffers, assistant agent of the bureau of fisheries in charge of the Seattle office, says that the flesh of young seals is quite palatable and tender, having the consistency and texture of prime beef. It has been used on the seal island for many years as the only fresh meat available, while seal brains and livers are of the finest quality.

TWO WHEATLESS DAYS ARE COMING

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—New home cards to be hung in the kitchens of 13,000,000 householders in the United States will be issued in a few days making Monday and Wednesday of each week wheatless days, and requesting a closer observance of the program for the conservation of wheat products.

The cards will also call special attention to the two porkless days, Tuesday and Saturday, with one porkless meal each day of the week.

"Eat more potatoes and corn products," is the slogan of the food administration, as explained in information received by W. B. Ayer, food administrator for Oregon.

because the seals live on fish their flesh would have a fishy flavor," said Mr. Christoffers, "but this is not the case. The fishy flavor is all in the bones, and for this reason the bones are removed from the meat before it is cooked. Only the shoulders are used, and a 3-year-old bull will yield from 50 to 60 pounds of choice meat. It is the intention of the government hereafter to preserve all the meat of the seals killed.

"All parts of the seal carcass will be utilized for commercial purposes. Even the entrails are used, making a high grade soft leather, while the lining of the throat is transformed into a very thin, tough leather."

This year, for the first time since 1910, there will be unrestricted killing of seals by the government, and it is expected that about 35,000 will be slaughtered, furnishing an immense quantity of meat in addition to the valuable pelts. In the seven years of protection, the Pribiloff seal herd has more than doubled, the census of 1917 giving a total of 463,374. In 1916, 116,977 seals were born at the rookeries.

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Germans Now Want Peace Before Spring

DATELESS—Peace advocates are again insistent in the central empire, hard upon the German chancellor's new declaration of Germany's warlike purposes. A report is current that the bolsheviks have decided not to continue the Brest-Litovsk peace negotiations, and another, quite unverified, that Austria is prepared to make a separate peace with Russia.

In Germany, Philipp Scheidman, the socialist leader, in his remarks following Chancellor von Hertling's speech, pleaded for peace before spring.

Regarding Russia, Scheidman issued a warning that the military leaders of the imperial government would be deposed if they did not bring about peace with her.

He insisted that there was ground for a general peace on the basis of the program laid down by President Wilson on eleven points of which an agreement was easily possible. He was as uncompromising as Chancellor

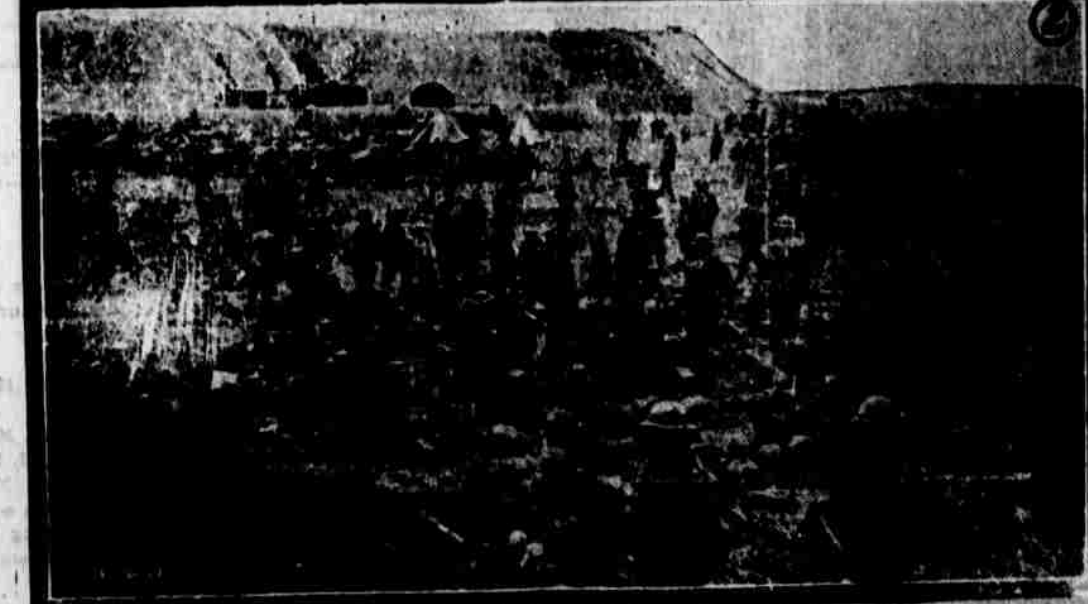
von Hertling, however, as regards Alsace-Lorraine, declaring this territory must remain German.

Scheidman's words comprise perhaps the most radical utterances that has yet come from the majority of moderate socialists in the reichstag. Foreign press comment on the speech of Chancellor von Hertling, however, points out that there is yet no sign of acknowledgment on the part of the German government of any responsibility to parliament, and that to all appearances the military party is still in full control.

The bolsheviks report an organization of Cossacks from the front into a congress which had declared war on General Kaledines, driven him and his staff from their headquarters and announces its purpose of hunting him down.

In the military situation there have been no developments of note. Artillery duels at isolated points, occasional raids and plentiful airplane reconnaissance are reported.

How British Received Supplies for Jerusalem Attack and Their Soldiers in Camp Before Final Assault



These are the first photographs to arrive in the United States showing the British forces operating directly on the Capture of Jerusalem. The top picture, No. 1, illustrates the difficulty of receiving supplies for the

invading forces. It shows a ship far out on the Palestine coast. Stores and equipment had to be brought in lifeboats thru the surf. The bot-

tom picture, No. 2, is a picture of the last camp the soldiers made before beginning the final attack which resulted in the capture of the Holy City, after years of Mohammedan reign.

International Relay Race Run in Hawaii

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—The recent 31-mile relay race held on the island of Hawaii, in which a message was carried from the rim of the crater of Kilauea volcano to the seacoast city of Hilo, 31 miles away, was an

international affair in every sense of the word. Six teams competed, made up of Hawaiians, Americans, Portuguese, Chinese, Japanese and Koreans.

The fact that the team made up of
