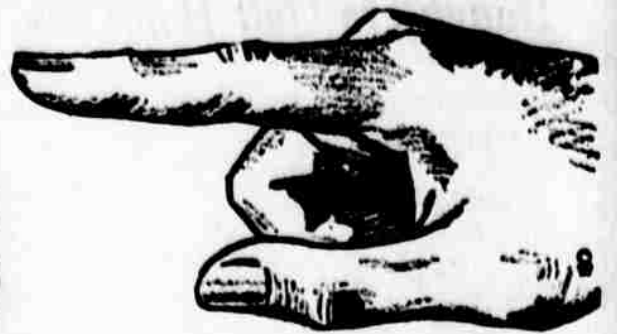

Convict Murdered at Folsom Prison

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—B. Castellana, sentenced on Ventura County for four years on a charge of robbery, was instantly killed Saturday in the yard of the Folsom state penitentiary by Joseph C. Negrete, serving a twenty-five year sentence on a charge of murder in the second degree.

The men were passing out of the prison on their way to the Folsom farm, when Negrete suddenly walked up to Castellana and without exchange of words, plunged a case knife

into his heart. The murderer refused to make any statement in explanation of the attack, but said that he "was glad that he did it."

An attack upon a fellow prisoner which results in his death is a capital offense, murder in the first degree. The penalty in this state is death on the scaffold.

Negrete had been considered a dangerous prisoner for some time, according to Warden J. J. Smith, while Castellana is said to have had a good record during his short imprisonment.

States, and are ready to go into service over seas whenever it is decided that they shall be moved. as fast as the troops become ready to use them.

Baker said: "We will have 500,000 men in France early this year. Germany has no idea of the number of men the United States now has in France. We will have a million and a half soldiers in France during the year of 1918," he said.

He described how great American railroad systems, one road 600 miles long, has been built in France, and told of the terminals, warehouses and other supply facilities which had been constructed for the army.

CATHOLIC OFFICERS CHOSEN

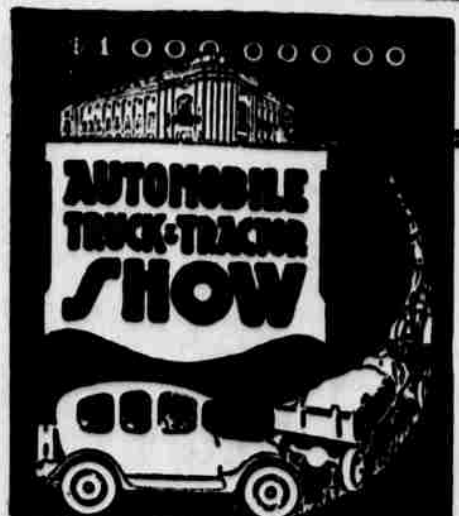
