Move By Women To Hamper Stockmen

PORTLAND, Jan. 30.—In voicing a protest against the invasion of the national parks by commercial interests that take away the attractiveness of the playgrounds, the General Federation of Women's Clubs has sent out a statement by Mrs. John M. Scott, which says in part:

"What are our national parks for—to be enjoyed by people or to be despoiled by cattle and sheep?"

"The invasion of the enemy is an expression that need not be limited to war usage. It exactly fits a condition of internal affairs here in the United States. The territories being invaded are the national parks. If the invasion continues these regions, which belong to all the American people,

will be monopolized by a few individuals.

"Certain interests, individual and collective, are constantly endeavoring to use these parks for their own commercial benefit. The friends of the people's playgrounds have again and again thwarted efforts that were being made to use these wonderlands for stock pasture. Now there are people who are taking advantage of the present need for increased food production to secure permission to graze cattle and sheep in our national parks.

"At Crater Lake National Park there is not a wild flower to be seen. Years ago sheep grazed within the boundaries, and although they have not been in the park for years, the ground is barren of flowers."

Rabbit Breeding Now A Patriotic Measure

EUREKA, Calif., Jan. 30.—In the belief that rabbit breeding will aid in offsetting the mounting prices and increasing scarcity of meats, many rabbit growers of Humboldt County will hold a pet stock exposition in Eureka, March 16, 17.

Every kind of rabbit known to

breeders will be shown, and particular emphasis laid upon the success with which school boys have raised enough rabbits on garden refuse to supply the family larder. It is believed that rabbit breeding will serve a useful and patriotic purpose in war time.

Government Rail Control Successful In England

LONDON, Jan. 30.—British railways which have been under state control since the beginning of the war, have been operated thru an executive committee of general managers of railways. The working under one control has resulted in many economies and proved of great ad-

vantage to the state. Under the original agreement made with the companies they are guaranteed the same net receipts as for 1913. Afterward the companies were given allowances in respect of new capital employed. Irish railways did not come under state control until 1916.

TRACT OF LAND WHICH LEGALLY ISN'T, IS

EUREKA, Calif., Jan. 30.—Not alone the fighting front of Europe presents to the world a "No-Man's Land." There is one in Mattole township, somewhere between Point Gorda and Blocksburg, in Humboldt County. It is unsurveyed land, belongs to no man, has no title or fee simple, can not be located upon by any person and legally does not exist.

Many years ago surveyors were hired at Eureka to survey the land in which this mysterious parcel was a part, and they grew disgusted and tired of the job, left the most of it incomplete, and one of the results, according to local tradition, was "No Man's Land," near the rough coast at Point Gorda. The land is not occupied or used.
