Big Demand For Doctors Coming

EUGENE, Jan. 31.—Advice to University of Oregon medical students to finish their courses so as to be better prepared to serve the United States, was given here by Dr. Harold R. Myers, assistant dean to the University Medical School at Portland, in an address to pre-medical students.

"Nearly all medical students are undecided as to what they should do at this time," Dr. Myers stated. "Many feel that they should drop their work in school and join the colors, while others are anxious to continue their medical work. This country should be guided by the experiences of the allies."

Dr. Myers then pointed out that when the war started England, France and Italy sent all their medical students to the front. However, they soon realized their mistake. Now those same governments have ordered many medical students to go back to school and continue their work, just as they would order a man to go into active service.

NEW NOVEL EVENT

FOR TRACK MEETS

CORVALLIS, Jan. 31.—Hand grenade throwing as a regular event at track meets is a suggestion that has been made as a direct result of the war. The proposal has been made for adoption in the Western conference. Dr. A. D. Browne of the Oregon Agricultural College has worked the event out as follows:

The participant will stand in a four foot square, and throw in twenty seconds five grenades. The throwing will be done in a trench, and accuracy to count. A supplementary event is designed for distance.

FINE NEW Y. M. C. A.

FOR UMATILLA COUNTY

PENDLETON, Jan. 31.—Umatilla County is to have a \$100,000 Y. M. C. A. building, located at Pendleton, if the plans of a number of prominent Umatilla County men materialize. A movement to obtain such a building was launched recently, and several donations of \$1,000 each to start the building fund were pledged. Men from Milton, Athens, Helix and Pendleton were parties to the movement, which would furnish a home for young men from other towns while in Pendleton.

SNOWFALL HEAVY IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—January has broken all snowfall records here, previous snowfall records in Chicago. The month's total is 39.6 inches. The nearest January total is that of 1886, which recorded 26.7 inches. The previous best record for any one month was in February, 1898, when 27.8 inches of snow fell. The average winter snowfall here is 36.3 inches. Since October, 1917, 51.4 inches of snow has fallen.

MEN GET POOR FOOD IN CAMPS

LOCAL MAN VISITS SON IN TEXAS
AND RETURNS WITH STATE-
MENT THAT BILL OF FARE IS
VERY MEAGRE

An endorsement of Senator George E. Chamberlain's recent charges on the inefficient management of the army is made by John E. Walker of this city, who has just returned from a visit with his son, Sergeant L. I. Walker, with the 110th Squadron of mechanics and engineers, at Kelley Field No. 2, San Antonio, Texas.

Mr. Walker asserts that the men in this squadron who are skilled mechanics, and accustomed to getting high wages and good living before entrance into the army, are subject to great lack of nourishing food, and are obliged to buy many of the necessities out of their own pockets.

He spent five days in the camp, where the following rations were given the men: Breakfast, bread, coffee and pancakes; dinner, stewed tomatoes and rice; supper, stewed fruit and hash. Those who got milk had to buy it.

All the regiments, Mr. Walker said, are not under the same regulations, but there are places where improvement is sadly needed. A distribution of underwear was made the men during Walker's visit to the camp.

His son drew three pairs of drawers with no shirts; others draw shirts and no drawers. If the man happened to be the same size as the underwear, he was fortunate. Otherwise he traded around if possible and found something he could wear.
