IN HUMAN SPOKE OF VILLA FOLLOWERS IN KILLING MEN CAPTURED ON WORK TRAIN IN CONFIDENTIAL

JAUHRE, Jan. 31.—The confirmation of the dynamiting of a Mexican Central work train by Villa followers on Saturday has been received here. A total of 145 men were killed by the Villa bandits, the entire train guard of 100 men being executed.

MORE AIR RAIDS

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Bombs were dropped in Essex and Kent in two raids by the enemy Monday night. There also were some casualties in Southwestern London. The Germans did not attempt to bomb the military objectives, and merely killed civilians,

mostly women and children. Three were killed and ten injured in the raid in London. It is feared that the bodies of six others are buried under the ruins of a house.
